


Introduction 🦳

Student Assessment

Developmental Reading Assessment (DRA)

The Developmental Reading Assessment is a method for assessing and documenting primary students' development as readers over time. Its purpose is to identify students' reading levels based on accuracy, fluency, and comprehension. The number in parentheses indicates the benchmark for that grading period.
