

#### Evaluation of Goals for 2011-2012

#### Goal 1 – Strengthen the school-wide mentoring program for students by partnering with local businesses, Shaw Air Force Base, and churches

The mentoring program has gained support in the community, local businesses, and Shaw Air Force Base. Informational meetings and trainings were conducted by the guidance counselor and school social worker. Identified students were partnered with mentors who met with the students on a regular basis. The program had a positive effect on student discipline.

#### Goal 2 - Implement early intervention strategies and programs to provide students who are at risk additional support

Intervention at the early grades of prekindergarten to second grade continued to be a focus at our school. We have a fully staffed prekindergarten program with a morning and an afternoon class. In addition, we have a daycare program that includes three year olds and provides developmentally appropriate learning activities before and after school for all grade levels. Kindergarten students had ample opportunities to grow and learn within a center-based classroom which features small group instruction as well as individual instruction. Our first grade students who are below level were able to participate in Reading Recovery which is a research based, individualized reading program. In addition, students in first and second grade who are struggling in reading were identified and worked in small groups with a highly trained reading specialist.

Goal 3 – Enhance instructional program to improve achievement as measured by grade level standards and PASS Our students continued to grow in the areas of language arts and math. Professional development in both areas enhanced student learning. Students were provided with multiple opportunities to read and write through school-wide reading incentives, writing contests, family activities, and individualized instruction. Math continued to show improvements as students became engaged with technology and problem solving strategies. Students were engaged in social studies and science with field studies, experiments, and the use of technology. Classroom libraries contain an abundance of non-fiction literature to provide students with the knowledge and understanding of grade-level social studies and science standards. With the use of video streamlining, students were able to experience the content and gain valuable information in history and real-life scientific topics. Projects and experiments were an important aspect of the social studies and science program.
