Performance Goal Area: School Climate

- **Goal 1: Reduce the incidence of in and out of school suspensions.**
- **Maintain home/school relations as noted by annual school survey responses.**

Our results: For the 2013-2014 school year, the number of in-school suspensions decreased from 7 to 5 while the number of out-of-school suspensions decreased from 26 to 12. In the 2014 survey, 75.8% of parents are satisfied with home/school relations, which is a decrease from 87.8% on the 2013 survey.

Performance Goal Area: Student Achievement

- **Goal 1: Students in all subgroups will meet or exceed the Annual Measureable Objectives for student performance in ELA, mathematics, science and social studies.**
- **Create and sustain a college-going and career readiness culture throughout grades K-4.**

Our results: In 2014, students in all subgroups met AMO in ELA; all but the Female and All Students subgroups met the AMO in mathematics. All but Females met AMO in Science, while the AMO was met by all subgroups in Social Studies.

Performance Goal Area: Teacher and Administrator Quality

- **Goal 1: 100% of classes will be taught by Highly Qualified teachers as defined by No Child Left Behind.**
- **Goal 2: Increase the diversity of the work force**
- **Encourage and train district personnel for upward mobility**

Our results: 97.5% of classes are taught by Highly Qualified teachers. The diversity of our workforce increased by one employee this year.

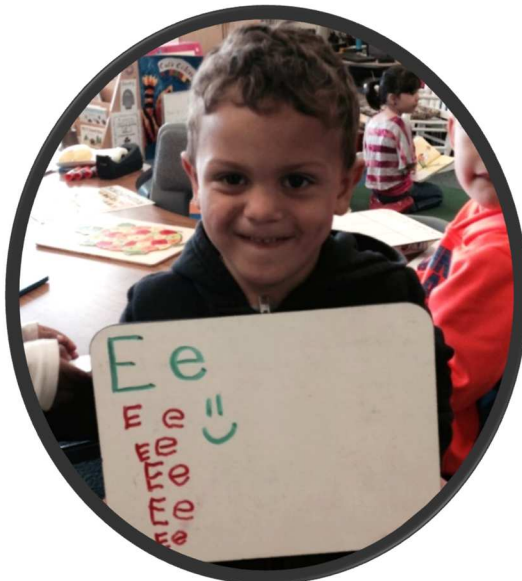
What's New?

Making Learning Relevant and Fun!

Hunter Street has worked diligently to keep our students moving forward in achievement. We are challenging our students on many levels to keep their minds sharp.

As a Professional Development School, our relationship with Winthrop University brings us many interns and field experience students from the university. Our Winthrop Faculty in Residence (WFIR) not only works with the college students, but leads the way in helping us improve science instruction. Our assistant principal and WFIR have arranged a series of workshops for our teachers on writing in the science classroom. Students are learning to write about their experiments and report results. Fourth grade students also participated in the CSI Turkey Gobbler Caper. Students used math, science, and writing skills to follow the evidence and solve the crime. At the end of the year, students in 3rd and 4th grades will participate in The Science Showcase, an open house for parents, to highlight the knowledge and skills learned this year.
