## SERVICE LEARNING <br> \& PARTNERSHIPS

- SuperBowl Math Fun with Dads: First grade classes invited all dads in for Super Bowl Math Fun! Each dad and their child rotated through football-themed stations to practice math skills that have been learned throughout the year. We encouraged our dads and students to be active participants and to wear their favorite team attire.
- 5th Grade Writing Celebrations: Parents were invited into each classroom for a celebration at the end of each writing unit. During the celebration, students escorted their parents around a writing display to read pieces from each student in the class. As they read, parents and students both left feedback notes for the student authors.
- The Springfield Times: Our newspaper club is composed of 25 members from the 4th and 5th grade who write and publish relevant articles both online and in paper form. This club gives students another opportunity to write authentic pieces and provides others with more reading opportunities.
- Junior Achievement: This program partners with community leaders to teach students how they benefit from and contribute to the success of their community. Through a series of five interactive lessons, students develop an understanding of careers and their positive impact on the community. The activities support state standards in social studies, English Language Arts, and math.
- Food Drive: The Student Council sponsored a canned food drive to benefit the Fort Mill Care Center. Approximately 1,000 pounds of food was collected.
- Pasta for Patients: The Student Council partnered with the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society for the fourth year in a row to raise over $\$ 3,000$ in honor of one of our students who is in remission from this disease.
- Red Bag Project: This is our fourth year conducting this program for children in need in our community. Our students raised $\$ 4,700$ for 30 children by doing extra chores and donating money. Gifts were purchased by volunteer shoppers who then assisted our students in wrapping the gifts.
