Magnet Programs

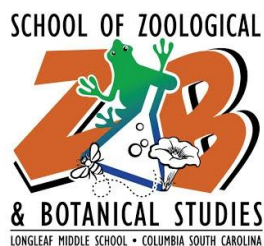
Longleaf Middle School is the home of two magnet programs (LEAP and ZooBot).
