Greenville Middle School began in 1938 as Greenville Junior High School in the building that had been Greenville High School. It was located on Prospect Hill at the head of what is now known as McBee Avenue. Originally constructed in 1888, the facility was the first public school building in the city.

Greenville Junior High School served the community from 1938 until 1965 at this location. By 1949, the school's population had increased to 1600 students. In the fall of 1965, Greenville Junior High moved to the current facility. When the school district implemented the middle school concept, Greenville Junior High School became Greenville Middle School.

Greenville Middle is a magnet middle school for Traditional and Global Studies, attracting students from all over Greenville County. We maintain an emphasis on reading, writing, and vocabulary development across the curriculum, and our students consistently perform at high levels each year. Our program includes a global focus which incorporates skills identified by the Profile of the SC Graduate. Greenville Middle is also the only middle school that offers a French immersion program. We have the largest strings program in the district. Additionally, we offer numerous courses for high school credit, athletics, clubs and various related arts courses including the recently added Gateway to Technology.

Greenville Middle continues to build upon the tradition of excellence from years past, preparing students to be ready for college and career.






