Our Goals

During the 2014-2015 school year, the percentage of students (grades 2-5) meeting/exceeding Target RIT on MAP reading will be maintained at 50.1% (186 out of 372) or will increase.

Strategies:

- Provide differentiated instruction in reading through the Balanced Literacy model
- Utilize common assessments and analyze data from common assessments for the purpose of planning instruction
- Utilize the Title I ELA Specialist for professional development and observations to identify strengths and weaknesses

For the 2014-2015 school year, the percentage of students (grades 2-5) meeting/exceeding Target RIT on MAP math will increase from 47.8% (162 out of 339) to 50% (186 out of 372).
