Our Mission

The students of Hollis Academy will be self motivated problem solvers and lifelong learners who demonstrate mastery of all grade level standards. An exemplary faculty and staff will provide a safe, nurturing learning environment supported by parents and the larger community.

Our History

The history of Hollis Academy began with the establishment of the Parker School District by Mr. Laurence Peter Hollis. Mr. Hollis was instrumental as the superintendent of the school district, where he served as Superintendent from 1923-1951. Hollis is proud to be named for Mr. L.P. Hollis and proud to continue his tradition of excellence in education. L.P. Hollis opened its doors in 1955. For the first thirty years, the school served both elementary and junior high school students. In 1986, Hollis began to serve only elementary school students. In 1996, Hollis Elementary became a year round magnet school and the name was changed to Hollis Academy. After 46 years in the old building, the new Hollis Academy opened in 2002. In August of 2008, Hollis Academy returned to the traditional school calendar and began to offer single gender classes.

Our School Today

Hollis Academy is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

Our current enrollment is 584 students.


Enrollment Demographics by Ethnicity
