

Palmetto Unified School District (PUSD) first opened its doors in 1981. In 2017, the District marked its thirty-sixth year of providing Correctional Education to the inmates of the South Carolina Department of Corrections. PUSD's staff and teachers consistently focus on quality performance in the midst of challenges and limited resources. The District continues to develop strategies to attract and keep properly certified teaching professionals.

As a special school district, PUSD is held accountable for three measures of performance effectiveness on the report card.

- Post test gains made on the Test of Adult Basic ٠ Education (TABE)
- GED passage rate
- Total number of students completing a vocational ٠ course

Palmetto Unified School District is comprised of nine high schools for students 17-21 and twenty-one adult education programs. The professional staff provide academic and vocational programming to include the SC Diploma, GED, WorkKeys, OJTs, Apprenticeships, Special Education and over 50 vocational classes to incarcerated adults.





Inmates are assigned to work in areas such as Prison Industries, cafeteria, maintenance, waste management, and recycling. The District has initiated an On the Job Training credentialing program to document these competencies or work skills. This credential is intended to increase an inmate's employability upon release.
