
Education Reduces Crime

Palmetto Unified School District Excellence in Education

In 1981 the SC Legislature recognized the need to provide structured educational programming for incarcerated youths (17-21) and adults sentenced to the SC Department of Corrections and thus authorized a statewide special school district-Palmetto Unified (PUSD).

Annually the staff delivers educational services to thousands of students through its ten high schools and twentyseven adult education programs. The staff is ever cognizant of the District's Mission, "To empower student inmates with life, vocational and academic skills to facilitate their successful reentry to society". Research has shown that the more skills inmates have upon release the less likely they are to recidivate. During the past thirty-one years more than 70,000 credentials, to include High School Diplomas, GED's , vocational and WorkKeys certificates, have been awarded. Many of the students receive the distinct honor of scoring in the top 5% of GED recipients in the state,

The District has been the recipient of the Palmetto Gold Award since 2002 for Academic Excellence as noted on the District's report card. For FY 2012 an absolute rating of **EXCELLENT** and a growth rate of **EXCELLENT** were achieved. As a special school district there are three measures of performance effectiveness rated on the report card:


- * Post test gains made on the Test of Adult Basic Education (TABE)

On-The-Job Training

Inmates in correctional facilities assigned to work areas, such as the cafeteria, facilities maintenance, waste management, recycling, etc. acquire job specific and interpersonal skills necessary for success in the workplace. The District staff is working with work area supervisors to document these technical competencies and soft skills through a certificate. The certificate would provide the recipients with documentation that could increase their employability options upon release.
