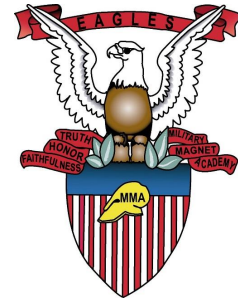
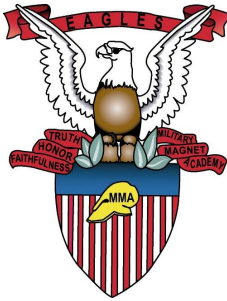

Located in the Chicora community of North Charleston, the academy serves 430 cadet scholars in grades 6 -12 from across Charleston County. The school is the only Title 1 funded full magnet organization in the cohort of CCSD.



Military Magnet Academy provides academic courses at all levels including; dual credit in collaboration with The Trident Technical College; Advanced Placement (AP) classes, as well as Career and Technology Education programs access through the CCSD Cooper River Center for Advanced Studies.

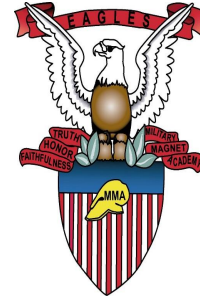
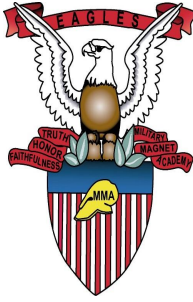


Academics at the Military Magnet Academy...

Organizational Data Summary

Student Achievement

Middle School (6 – 8)

The Military Magnet Academy is located in North Charleston, SC and has an enrollment of 446 students in grades 6-12 with 66% African American, 30% Hispanic, 3% Caucasian, and 1% other. Military Magnet Academy is a Title I school with 85.2% poverty determined by the Community Eligibility Provision. Overall, Military Magnet trails the District on SC Ready ELA (16% meets/exceeds), SC Ready Math (13% meets/exceeds), and SCPASS Science (11% meets/exceeds in 6th grade). An achievement gap exists between African American students and all students on SC Ready ELA (16% meets/exceeds; 10 percentage points lower than all) and SC Ready Math (7% meets/exceeds; 15 percentage points lower than all). Furthermore, students with disabilities are significantly underperforming all students on SCPASS Science. The utilization of formative data within and across grade levels and learners to improve achievement is a key focus area. The state testing in ELA, Math, and 6th grade Science will be administered in spring 2023. When comparing CCSD data and our school, the district performance is higher in all three areas. However, an analysis of individual student growth reflects a more positive report. For Reading, students in grades 6-8 showed overall growth of 7 - 11%. In math, students in grades 6-8 showed a slight decline in overall growth. A strong number of students are growing ELA and Math skills, but these students need additional focus to build and increase these skills. Grade 8 continues to be a critical grade for proficiency in order to boost the English and Math success of 9th grade. We have a large group of students in Middle School who compose our Approaches group in both content areas. (24% in ELA and 41% in Math) By employing specific strategies to impact the Approaches group, we will be able to increase our Meets/Exceeds performance. We will continue to refine strategies to support growth in both Math and Reading, and data-driven decisions will be made to support students through extended day and extended year/summer programming.

High School (9 – 12)

The Military Magnet Academy has grades 6-12. The ACT, SAT, and WIN tests are the indicators of both college and career readiness. For college readiness, we are now analyzing the percent of 3rd-year high school students who score 1020 or higher on the SAT; 20 or greater on the ACT composite score; pass AP classes with a 3 or higher; or earn a minimum of 6 credit hours with a C or higher in Dual Enrollment courses. The Military Magnet Academy needs to increase the percentage of students meeting the SAT/ACT benchmarks. However, we have performed well with 3rd and 4th year cadet scholars enrolled in Dual Enrollment courses having successfully completed 6+ credits at a percentage rate of 13 and 15%.

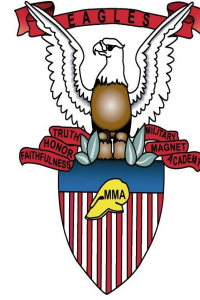
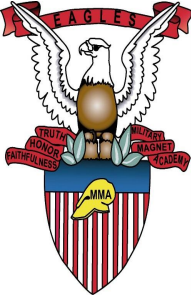
We need to improve SAT/ACT performance and continue to promote and support our students enrolling in Dual Enrollment. In regards to College and Career Readiness, the 2022 data shows 50.1% of MMA scholars meet the expectation. We continue to focus on the preparation of Juniors to be successful on the Career tests in both WIN and ASVAB. We also need to increase the number of students who participate in internships and national certification. The graduation rate continues to be strong with 2021-2022 at 96%. Military Magnet Academy outperformed the district with 85% and outperformed all other Title I schools. Addressing long term improvement in College and Career readiness, we will focus on proactive supports to students beginning in the 9th grade

Teacher/ Administrator Quality

The Military Magnet's teaching staff brings a variety of cultural experiences and teaching expertise with 7% of teachers having 1-2 years of experience; 34% have 3-10 years of experience; 23% have 11-20 years of experience; and 36% of our teachers have over 20 years of experience. The rate of Teachers returning to MMA is consistently exceeds 85% annually. The stability of our faculty is a positive factor as we continue to increase student performance and recoup skills from the virtual environment we have experienced. Our school is working to provide an increase in professional development opportunities as we continue our focus on the academic, social and emotional needs of our students. Faculty participation in relevant professional development will be an ongoing emphasis to enhance faculty satisfaction and increase the SEL skills of our staff.

School Climate

In the area of School Climate, the weakest factor is the parents' perception of changes made based upon parental input and feedback. 75% of parents reported that they were satisfied with the learning environment at MMA. We need to increase positive parental involvement by creating strategies that help parents feel their voices are heard and to increase their sense of partnership in our students' success. Although any degree of chronic absenteeism is concerning, the Military Magnet rate is 17.1%. This is the lowest rate of any Title I school in CCSD. We will continue to address absenteeism and all school climate factors by implementing effective strategies to boost family participation.
