21st Century Skills

We are also implementing AVID schoolwide through our focus on 21st Century skills.

Leadership Academy @ Muller Road

The Leadership Academy is an honors magnet program providing a rigorous curriculum based on E.D. Hirsch's Core Knowledge with an emphasis on school, community, and global leadership skills. This year, the Leadership Academy will promote its first group of 8th grade students. Of the 85 8th grade students moving to 9th grade, 18 of them were Junior Scholars.

This program provides a weekend's worth of food in a backpack for homeless students.


