Highlights of 2015-2016:

- We provided academic enrichment for targeted 3rd and 4th grade students in our Discoveries After-School Program and academic assistance for our ESOL students in our ESOL After-School Program.
- We initiated a Student Council with representation from each 2nd –4th grade homeroom. This group of school leaders planned service projects for our local community, such as a canned food drive, a flood relief drive, and a "Soaps for Seniors" collection for our local nursing home.



- Our "audition based" after school performing arts club, JAM'N, rehearsed and performed two original musical productions.
- * Over 200 people visited our HCJ Arts Showcase.
- Our One Book/One School initiative cultivated a love for reading through trivia games, prizes and a school -wide assembly. A grant from York Electric Cooperative provided each student and faculty member with a personal copy of the book, *How to Steal a Dog.*
- Students attended a Career Fair with over 20 different presenters.

- We participated in two major service learning projects;
 Relay for Life and Dolly Parton Imagination Library.
- Our morning news crew learned about telecommunications as they wrote, directed and produced our news show. The students toured the York Middle School journalism class, as well as CN2 News studio.

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- Our Student of the Month recognition program recognized 185 different students for their classroom achievements.
- Our "Palmetto Reading Bowl" Pep Rally featured special visitors Cocky and The Tiger, and included footballs autographed by coaches Spurrier and Swinney as reading incentives.
- Our Read Across America and Black History Month celebrations culminated in a school wide assembly. Mr. Steve Love, a local and National NCAAP leader, cohosted the assembly which included an interactive reading bowl challenge and step team performances by YIS and Winthrop University.
