

#### Town Hall Meeting/ Student Leadership

Students have the privilege of leading these meetings for their grade levels. At these meetings, birthdays are announced, student learning is highlighted, and student accomplishments are celebrated.

#### Student-Led Conferences and Passages

This is the fourth year that sixth and seventh grade students have conducted student-led conferences with their parents. Eighth grade students lead passage presentations for a panel of community members and teachers. This presentation is a reflection of their learning and goals as they transition from middle school to high school.

#### iCivics

We offer a three-pronged iCivics class focusing on government, leadership, and service learning. iCivics makes learning about civic duty and responsibility a priority for all. iCivics students mentor elementary students on a weekly basis.

#### MGM Gator Apprentice

Eighth-grade iCivics students are offered an authentic learning experience in applying and interviewing for a job at Chick-Fil-A. The winner is offered a part-time position at the Chick-Fil-A Saluda Pointe location upon turning 15 years of age.

EL Education	Service Learning
EL Education is modeled to challenge students to think critically and take active roles in their classrooms and communities. An EL school aligns curriculum, instruction, assessment, culture and character, and leadership into a cohesive, clear vision for student learning.	In every Expedition, there is a service learning component. This year, 6th grade students filled 21 duffle bags for Families of Hope. Seventh grade students learned about the true cost of consumerism and made efforts to support local economies by supporting Heifer International, the Pulsera Project, and through the creation of a buyer's guide to locally owned businesses.
STEM Education	World Language
Using a variety of activity-based learning models, students are provided science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) opportunities to foster reasoning and critical thinking skills, creativity, and innovation.	World languages are part of the core curriculum at MGM. Students experience language learning through performance-based tasks and assessments. We offer Spanish, French, Latin, and Chinese (Mandarin).



#### Heart and Sole and Run Hard

These clubs inspire students to be healthy and confident using a fun, experience-based curriculum which creatively integrates running. Both clubs equip students to run a 5K race.

#### Recycling

iCivics classes continue to support the school-wide recycling initiative. Through the Department of Health and Environmental Control, we are a Green Steps School.

#### **Unified PE**

Sixth Grade students work with exceptional students through PE, dance, and drama. Over 100 students participate and coach our Special Olympics athletes.
