Focused School Renewal Goals

Goal 1: By the end of the school year, the number of students scoring met or exemplary in ELA will increase by 10%. This will result in a reduction in the number of students who are not met to 29.3% or below in grade 7 and 35.3% or below in grade 8.

Goal 2: By the end of the school year, the number of students scoring met or exemplary in Math will increase by 10%. This will result in a reduction in the number of students who are not met to 30.0% or below in grade 7 and 20.2% or below in grade 8.

Administrators and teachers will:

- Align instruction to the state standards.
- Participate in and implement research-based staff development to improve teaching practices.
- Use books for reading that are matched to students' independent reading levels.
- Implement a rewards-based plan for improving academic achievement, student attendance, and student behavior.

- Create opportunities for parents to become familiar with the school setting, become knowledgeable about school programs, and be active participants in their child's academic career.
- Target students who are within a ten point range of a scoring category on PASS for specialized instruction across the curriculum.
