PUSD and SCDC will provide students with relevant academic courses, highly effective career related vocational programs, and necessary life skills to make a positive impact in society.

SIC Annual Goals

The goals identified by the School Improvement Council for this year are as follows:

- By 2023, 80% of student inmates enrolled in school will earn a certification in WIN, HS Diploma, or its equivalency, Career Technical Education, or Employability skills.
- Trenton HS will increase the number of GEDs earned in 2022 by 45% in 2023.

Our goal is to increase the number of student inmates served and ensure that each student inmate that leaves the institution leaves with some type of credential. To date Trenton is on target of surpassing its second goal despite the challenges in providing instruction caused by the pandemic.

Student Achievement

To date Trenton HS students have received 25 High school Equivalency Diplomas and over 170 Vocational certificates. 78% of our students achieve at least 1 credential prior to their release from Trenton.

Additional Information

Trenton High School struggles with sufficient access to students, lock downs, and proper certified staff to deliver instruction at the appropriate levels. Most students enter after their graduation date, with an average of 10 credits and one year remaining incarcerated. On the average, incarcerated students are in school up to three hours per day. Trenton High School has aggressively worked to obtain transcripts, screen students, determine pathway of completion and establish an educational plan.
