SIC Annual Goals

During the 23-24 school year, the HSMS SIC decided to focus on building a partnership with the HSMS PTO as a fundraising entity to support the vision of creating a caring closet for students in need of basic clothing and hygiene needs. A generous donation of \$3,000 from an individual donor has made the outlay of this project a reality. The SIC looks forward to implementing the closet during the 24-25 school year, as the raising of the funds, purchasing of the racks and other goods has taken place this year.

The team worked with local businesses, churches, and individuals to procure organizational materials as well as the products to go in the caring closet. We look forward to being able to better serve students who are experiencing need in the upcoming years with these generous donations.

Student Achievement

Highland Springs Middle School opened during the 23-24 school year so data reported was from the feeder schools from where students had matriculated.

ELA proficiency on the middle level in ACPSD was 50.4% in the 2023 school year – as measured through SC Ready Testing. This is below the state average of 52% proficiency which is well below the goal for the state of 70% proficiency in ELA by 2030. The current proficiency as determined by NWEA MAP Spring 24 data at HSMS is 54 leaving a significant amount of growth need to reach the goal of 70% mastery.

Math proficiency on the middle level in ACPSD was 33.7% in the 2023 school year – as measured through SC Ready Testing. This is in alignment with the state average of 33.1% proficiency which is much below the expected 70% proficiency goal of 2030. The current achievement as determined by NWEA MAP Spring 24 data at HSMS is 41% meeting or exceeding grade level standards.

Additional Information

As the newest school in Aiken County Public Schools, Highland Springs Middle School draws students from both areas 2 and 3 as well as many feeder schools. With students coming from many different areas and existing schools, one main goal for HSMS was to build a culture of teamwork and inclusion.
