As the newly elected principal of North Charleston High School (NCHS), I have found administrators, teachers, and staff to be professionally and altruistically concerned for all students. Students have been progressing academically with new initiatives forthcoming such as writing across the curriculum, smaller class sizes, students having the opportunity to choose among eight Advanced Placement courses, and educational stakeholders hoping to incorporate an International Baccalaureate program in the future.

NCHS, as of the present year, earned approximately \$250,000 in scholarships not including State based scholarships; five students have been accepted into Clemson University; several students have received early acceptance from the University of South Carolina and Furman University; the award winning band procured 1st and 2nd places in every competition entered and was featured in NeedToBreath's music video; five out of the six wrestlers who competed at the State level won medals; and fifty students were given opportunities for summer work under the auspices of Charleston County Council.


Cougar Academics
