The Jennie Moore Experience

Learning For All Students:

In the eighth year of implementation, Jennie Moore has continued to administer the MAP test to all students. Three times a year students are assessed in the areas of Reading, Math and Language. Teachers use this information to plan for and guide their instruction.

Teacher Collaboration:

Classroom teachers and special area teachers collaborate to provide students with integrated learning experiences. Grade level curriculum standards are infused in the arts program and the arts standards are infused in the classroom. Teachers and specialists work together to develop intervention programs for students needing additional assistance.

Foreign Language:

Jennie Moore is one of only four elementary schools in Charleston County to offer foreign language. Spanish instruction begins in kindergarten and continues through fifth grade, preparing students for advanced foreign language courses.

Community

JME teachers, staff and students support over a dozen charities by raising funds and awareness for these programs. One of our largest fundraising charity events was Jump Rope For Heart.

Quarterly, **Fridays with Felder and Fitz** offers all parents an opportunity for open discussions with the administration on current topics of interest.

In conjunction with National Center for Safe Routes to School, JME sponsored a **Bike To School Day** in October and again in March. Many students and their parents enjoyed an early morning ride to school.

Literacy Initiatives

- The Literacy Team, sponsored by the PTA, organized and implemented several initiatives to encourage both students and families to read throughout the year.

- Home Keading Awards were given to several JME families for their commitment to reading at home

Healthy School Initiatives

- JME is proud of our Healthy School Initiative aimed at helping children make conscious choices in fueling their bodies and exercising. Offered this year were programs such as:
- Taste It Tuesdays Children were encouraged to try a new fruit/vegetable on Taste It Tuesday each quarter.
- **Healthy Choice Lunches** offered balanced menu options free of fried foods.
- The JME Fitness Club participated in several fun run events. Students ran in the Roper St. Francis Jingle Bell Run in December and Charleston's Bridge Run Kid's Run in April.
- JME Track Team included approximately 20 students who competed in the local Hershey

- Theatrical Productions: "Aladdin" highlighted the talents of the entire fifth grade.
- Drama: every student was provided with an opportunity to perform on stage in front of an audience.
- The Fifth Annual Jennie Moore Hoedown: showcased creativity of all children through talents developed in PE, Drama and Music.
- World Language Week: enriched the lives of our students through exposure to different cultures and traditions.
- PTA Reflections is a national art competition that encourages students to create works of art based on a theme. Over 100 pieces of art were submitted by our students. Students earned awards at the District and State levels.
- Engaging Creative Minds integrates creative experiences with community artists into the curriculum for students in grades 3-5.

Focus on At-Risk Students

- I-Beam Program supported students with weekly one-on-one mentoring. Mentors read with students for thirty minutes and then joined them for lunch and special bonding time.
- Primary Grade Academy served selected first, second and third grade students by providing oneon-one and small group reading assistance.
- Challenged students were given extra periods of direct instruction in a small group setting during the school day.
- Volunteers provided one-on-one reading assistance to many eager students.
- Reading Recovery Program provided first grade students additional help in reading with intense one on one instruction.
- Universal Screening for all kindergarten students helps identify those students at-risk and needing additional help as first graders.
