SCHOOL SPONSORED STUDENT ACTIVITIES AND OPPORTUNITIES

Character Education (Good Citizens)

Students are recognized for positively modeling the character word for each month. The Good Citizen from each homeroom receives a pencil, certificate & a free kids meal from Chick-fil-a. At the end of each month, all of the Good Citizens are eligible for a drawing to become the Student of the Month. This student receives a certificate and gets a \$25.00 gift card to Wal-mart provided by Cytec, Inc. Scott Humston presented his Pro Kids Show on character education for the student body and held a family night performance.

Most Improved Students

At the end of each nine weeks, students are recognized for having improved in either grades or behavior. Each student receives a ribbon and a certificate. They enjoy lunch on stage and are given special treats.

K-Kids (A Kiwanis Club sponsored program)

K-Kids consist of a group of fifth graders who are involved in helping with various school-based community projects throughout the school year.

Projects include:

Food drive for Golden Harvest Food Bank, food drive for Aiken County Animal Shelter, volunteered at animal shelter, made Christmas cards for soldiers, made socks for the elderly, item drive for the Be A Bunny project, bird food strings, participated in the Graniteville Christmas parade, colors for Costa Rica, and Ronald McDonald House. They also collected gift cards for a family who lost their home in a fire.

How Full is Your Bucket?:

This is a school-wide program where students earn "raindrops" for being kind to others. Raindrops are placed in a classroom bucket. At the end of each month, the teacher draws a name from their bucket to participate in a fun activity. At the end of each nine weeks, the class earning the most raindrops will be treated with a free ice cream funded by the PTO.

Parenting Nights

Byrd has two parenting nights during the school year. Parents are invited to hear teacher presentations on reading and math strategies. After the presentations, the students and parents are treated to a meal.

Book Fair

Our Media Center at Byrd has two Scholastic Book Fairs per year; one in the Fall and one held in the Spring. There are two parent nights, as well, for each book fair.

Books & Badges

Byrd has partnered with the Aiken County Sheriff's office this year. Once a week an officer comes to the school and reads with the second grade classes.

Guest Speakers

Students enjoyed several guest speakers throughout the school year who shared their experiences and skills.

Good News Club

This is a faith based club sponsored by a local church that students are allowed to attend every Thursday after school.

Looney Tunes Banking

Students learn how to save money by opening a savings account with Security Federal Bank. They are allowed to participate by making weekly deposits. Our fifth graders gain experience by acting as the bankers under a bank representative's supervision.

Bully Free Program

Students in the third, fourth, and fifth grades participated in the "Bully-Free School" assembly. The third grade had Bully Free Poster Contest. Fourth grade held a Bully Free performance and the Fifth grade had a essay writing contest.

Byrd Chorus

Students in fourth and fifth grades can participate in the Byrd Chorus. Students must show discipline and dedication to improve their vocal and performance skills. The chorus has performed at various events at Byrd and in the community. Also, students enjoyed attending a Symphony Orchestra Augusta Youth Concert and a piano presentation at USC Aiken.
