Curriculum and Instruction

This year our focus at CMS has been devoted towards engaging students in STEAM lessons and project-based learning. Students have also had 1 to 1 technology access available in every classroom. The 1 to 1 technology has also made the Success Maker program and Study Island readily available to all students with the hopes of increasing student achievement in all areas. Response to Intervention (RTI) was implemented through reading and math to meet the needs of students who were struggling in specific areas according to MAP data.
