School Achievements

TCTC is strongly committed to educating the students of Colleton County in the vocational career fields to allow them to become productive citizens. In doing so, TCTC has created thriving completer programs in culinary arts, drafting, masonry, agriculture, welding, carpentry, engineering, and auto tech. Next year, TCTC will add completer programs such as early childhood education and machine technology.

HArts students from Mrs. Sally Davis' 3-D Art and photography class sifted through their parents discarded furniture to do a little Spring cleaning. In a matter of 2 weeks, these students did a remarkable job of turning unwanted trash into treasure while completing an inspiring "Trash to Treasure" instructional unit.

Project-based learning (PBL) is at the heart of the New Tech instructional approach. Teachers design rigorous projects tied to state and district standards and customize them to suit the needs and interests of their students. Students then work in teams to acquire and apply knowledge and skills to solve problems. Trust, respect, and responsibility are the hallmarks of the culture at New Tech, where students and teachers alike share ownership of the learning experience and their school environment.

Colleton County High School hosted the 66th annual South Carolina Association of Student Councils State Convention. Over the weekend, the 500+ delegates listened to nationallyrenowned keynote speakers, attended leadership workshops, and participated in activities including bingo and a dodge ball tournament. On Saturday night, the students attended a banquet and dance in the gym of CCHS. During the weekend, delegates campaigned for the coming year, while senior Hannah Houck completed her term as SCASC State President. The event was an absolute success due to the hard work of Mrs. Goodwin and the CCHS Student Council. The convention was a wonderful experience for the delegates, a great learning experience for our own CCHS Student Council members and a positive reflection of Colleton County High School statewide.

This past fall semester, SHHS had 23 students that took the Certified Nurse Assistant exam. All 23 students passed the exam. In addition, we had six students attend the HOSA State Leadership Conference. Three students placed $5^{\rm th}$ in Public Service Announcement, one student placed $5^{\rm th}$ in Medical Photography, and one student placed $3^{\rm rd}$ in Human Growth and Development Knowledge.

CCHS/TCTC SIC voted the following two goals for the 2013-14 school year focus:

Student attendance as reported by the state will increase to 99.9% by 2015.

Thomas Finigan was named to the 2014 US Army All American Marching Band (only the 2nd All American ever from Colleton County in any activity). Band of Blue had 14 members earn SCBDA Region Band Honors. Band of Blue "Varsity" Winterguard won the CWEA Edisto Winter Competition. Band of Blue Concert and Symphonic Bands performed at the 2014 SCBDA State Concert Festival at West Ashley. Band of Blue "Varsity" Winterguard placed first in the Scholastic AA Gold Division of the 2014 Carolina Winter Ensemble Association Winterguard and Indoor Percussion Championship.

Commander Thornton is proud of the CCHS NJROTC unit. They placed in the top 15% in Region 5 National Academic Meets, received first place in the Marching Band category at the Yemassee Festival, and placed first in the North Charleston NJROTC drill meet. CCHS hosted the Regional Rifle Team Meet, assisted with the Adopt-a-Highway program, and filled, as well as, delivered 200+ Stockings for Soldiers.

Additional Information

At Colleton County High School, we are proud of the academic accomplishments of all of our students during the 2012-2013 year. The Class of 2013 graduated 319 students with 289 State High School diplomas and 21 State Certificates, and 9 Employability Certificates. This class included 6 Palmetto Fellows, 61 Life Scholarships and 40 Hope Scholarships, and a total scholarship amount of \$3,157,566.00

CCHS absolute rating on most recent S.C. School Report Card was "average" for the third consecutive year. Our first time passage rate for HSAP increased from 67.4% in 2012 to 68.7% in 2013. The overall passage rate for all students on the End of Course assessments increased from 51.9% in 2012 to 60.3% in 2013. Our graduation rate has increased 15% in the last five years and was 74.4% in 2013.
