

We have used Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) to track growth over the course of the year. The following graph shows the percentage of students scoring Met or Above on the fall and winter testing.


## **Demographic Information**


Brockington Elementary Magnet School for Science and Technology is a part of the Darlington County School District, and is located just outside the Darlington city limits. Brockington presently serves students in grades three through five. Prior to 2006-2007, the school served grades 4-6, and this changed when a new middle school was built. The magnet school component made its debut during the 2001-2002 school year. While Brockington continues to serve the students for which it is zoned, parents in the Darlington area may submit an application for their children to attend BES as magnet students. The total enrollment for the 2010-2011 school year averages 435 students. The ethnic makeup of the school is 55.5% African -American, 41.2 % Caucasian, and 3.3% other. Brockington is a Title I site and 78.4% of our students receive free or reduced-price lunch.

### **PASS Testing Information**

In 2009, the state of South Carolina transitioned from taking the Palmetto Achievement Challenge Test (PACT) to the Palmetto Assessment of State Standards (PASS). Since the implementation of PASS in 2009, Brockington has consistently held an Average Absolute Rating and Growth Rating. Brockington's overall achievement from 2010 to 2011 showed growth in the areas of ELA, Math and Writing, while a drop was noted on the Science and Social Studies subtests.

The chart above shows that Brockington had a higher percentage of students scoring "Met" and "Exemplary" in ELA, Math, Social Studies and Writing. The only area in which less students scored "Exemplary" was on the Science subtest.

### AYP Results

Brockington has been performing well when we look at most of the subgroups measured by Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP). Our students with disabilities have not scored well enough for the school to meet AYP for several years. In 2009, we missed making AYP in two out of 21 categories. We were pleased in 2010 to meet the criteria for the disabled population in English Language Arts. In 2010, we met AYP criteria in 20 out of 21 categories, and Disabled Math was our remaining weak area. In 2011, we were extremely pleased to have met the criteria for the disabled population in all subject areas.

Since Brockington is a Title I School, and we failed to meet AYP in 2 areas, we are in the Planning to Restructure phase of the Title I School Improvement process. We will continue to work on improving in all areas as we focus on improving the percentage of African American students scoring "Met" or "Exemplary" on the ELA subtests of PASS. We will also work to improve the percentage of students receiving subsidized meals scoring "Met" or "Exemplary" on the ELA subtests of PASS, so that AYP is attained in these areas.
