SPECIAL RECOGNITIONS AND ACTIVITIES

CERTIFIED NURSING ASSISTANTS – There were twenty-four students enrolled in Health Science II. These students took the National Health Science Assessment in January and had 100% pass rate. There are twenty-two students enrolled in Health Science Clinical Studies and they are scheduled to take the Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) exam in May. Mrs. Connie Altman, Mrs. Kellie Flowers, and Mrs. Nancy Huntley prepare Health Science students for immediate careers or further education. Certified Nursing Assistants are needed to fulfill job openings at a variety of medical facilities including nursing homes, doctor's offices, and hospitals. Starting salaries are usually around \$22,460.

DECA - On December 6, 2017, Mrs. Pam Smith took marketing students from DCIT to compete in the Region II DECA Competitive Events at Westwood High School in Blythewood, SC. DUAL CREDIT AND ARTICULATION AGREEMENTS-

One hundred, thirty-five students received the opportunity to earn dual credit for courses through Florence-Darlington Technical College. Students enrolled in Marketing, Accounting, Machine Tool, Welding, Internet and Web Design, Microcomputer Applications, Professional Development and Office Procedures earned high school and college credit. Additionally, students enrolled in Automotive Technology, Business Law, Engineering, Entrepreneurship, and Computer Service Repair receive articulated credit if they earn a B or higher. Some of the students are graduating with as many as 24 college credits through the dual credit program.

ENGINEERING/CARPENTRY/ELECTRICITY – Students in Engineering, Carpentry, and Electricity participated in a cross-curricular project. Engineering students drew the blueprints for a house constructed by Carpentry students and wired by Electricity students.


