Lake View Elementary Accomplishments

- In August 2014, Lake View Elementary was named a Title One Reward School for the third year in a row.
- Lake View Elementary has been named a Palmetto Gold or Palmetto Silver School for the last eight years in a row.
- Lake View Elementary exceeded the state average on SCPASS in English/Language Arts, Science, and Social Studies.
- On the 2014 School Report Card, Lake View Elementary received an Absolute Rating of Average.
- Under the ESEA/Federal Accountability Rating System, Lake View Elementary earned an 89.5 with a grade of B.

Lake View Elementary Highlights

- An Individualized Instructional Plan was designed for every student through the Compass Learning Program, based on the students' MAP test score data. Compass Learning is a web based program, and therefore students can access their individualized plan at home.
- Students continue to receive a free breakfast in the classroom every morning. This ensures all students
 begin their school day with a nutritious breakfast and will enable them to perform at their maximum
 potential for learning.
- The library continues to conduct Library Late Night once a month. Parents and students may come in and use the computers to conduct research or check out books together.
- PTO Board Members are actively involved in school events and support many student and teacher activities.
