2010-2011 SCHOOL YEAR ACCOMPLISHMENTS

East Elementary School serves pre-kindergarten through third grade and is home to over 580 students who present a variety of abilities, economic and cultural backgrounds, basic needs, and learning styles.

Listed below are a few school highlights of which we are proud:

- A coach/consultant was hired to assist 5K teachers in targeting at-risk students.
- School programs and science kits were used to enhance the science curriculum.
- Parent Nights were held every quarter to showcase grade level activities.
- Universal (free) breakfast was available for all students to ensure a good start to each day.
- PASS Parent Night was held to provide students and parents with information about the statewide 3rd grade assessment that would take place at the end of the school year.
- The Sonday Reading System was continued as an early reading/reading intervention program in grades 4K and 5K.
- DIBELS assessments were used to track progress in reading for at-risk students.
- Conducted service learning projects to encourage students to help others.
- Maintained 100% of faculty being Highly Qualified.
- Conducted weekly grade level planning sessions to ensure coverage of state standards.
- Saxon Math was used as an intervention program for at-risk math students
- Let's Play Learn was used in 4K classrooms to better prepare those students for early reading.
- Computers for parent use were available in the media center and computer lab.
- Technology integration was increased through the use of twenty-nine Promethean Boards, one Activote and twenty-nine document cameras and two portable computer labs.
