## School Accomplishments

### 2020-2021 School Accomplishments

- Provided reading instruction using guided, shared and independent reading strategies.
- Improved students' reading skills by utilizing flexible reading groups within the classrooms.
- Developed standards-based lessons geared toward South Carolina College-and Career-Ready Standards in English Language Arts and Math.
- Completed daily math activities that covered concepts related to time, money, calendar skills and other standards tested on SC READY.
- Hosted Title I/Parent Meetings/Open House to encourage parental involvement (on site and/or virtually) as well as Quarterly Academic Awards Programs, Character Day Parade, and an iReady Success Parade.
- Organized distribution of Take-Home Meals and Snack Bags for students.
- Invited parents to visit five to seven times during the school year for Orientation, Report Card conferences and Parent Conference Days.
- Invited community members to read to students during Read Across America Week and to participate in Fire Prevention Week and Red Ribbon Week activities.
- Continued the volunteer reading program for 4K.
- Scheduled educational assemblies for all students (Diversity Circus, Stranger Things, and Learning to Get Along).
- Provided staff development opportunities for teachers in relation to Positive Behavior Intervention Support Strategies (PBIS), ELA and math educational trends, research-based strategies, iReady, technology, brain-based research, and Differentiation Instruction.
- Increased technology integration using classroom Promethean Boards, computer and keyboarding labs, one-to-one tablets for reading and math activities, and the use of on-line resources, such as Study Island, i-Ready, LetterLand, and TEAMS.
- Continued Tier I Positive Behavior Intervention Supports (PBIS) schoolwide.
- Provided guidance lessons for students in kindergarten through third grade that focused on positive character traits.
- Published weekly classroom newsletters to inform parents of standards being taught and weekly school newsletters with important school related information, student recognition, and tips for parents regarding student attendance, study strategies, and life skills.
- Conducted weekly grade level data and planning sessions to ensure coverage of the state standards and to encourage collegiality among certified staff members.

## School Improvement Council Annual Act 135 Summary Report

The principal, Jan Powers-Penuel, and School Improvement Council members have prepared this Annual Summary Report for parents and community members interested in the school. The report reviews accomplishments made last year, as well as test score data and accreditation information.

ACT 135 mandates that schools develop a comprehensive plan to improve the academic performance of students and educational services for students. South Elementary developed a five-year School Renewal Plan with accountability elements for 2017-2022. It was submitted to the South Carolina Department of Education (SCDE). The school is currently completing goals and objectives for the fifth year of the five-year plan. The School Renewal Plan included performance goals in four areas: Student Achievement, School Climate, Teacher/Administrator Quality and Certification/Professional Development. Planning is underway for a new five-year comprehensive plan and will be submitted to the South Carolina Department of Education (SCDE). It will cover goals and objectives for 2022-2027.

## Profile of the South Carolina Graduate

South Elementary School is helping all students develop the World Class Knowledge/Skills and Life and Career Characteristics identified on the *Profile of the South Carolina Graduate* by teaching the South Carolina College-and Career-Ready Standards for English Language Arts and mathematics. Faculty and staff members are also helping students develop strong interpersonal skills and to use critical thinking skills as they solve real world problems.

## Report Card Rating

As a result of the COVID-19 Pandemic and the resulting disruptions in teaching and learning, Rating Points and Ratings were not calculated for the 2020-21 Report Cards.

## Goals and Strategies for Improvement

### Administrators and Teachers will:

- Continue the South Carolina Teaching Standards (SCTS) model to allow teachers to gain knowledge related to state expectations for student growth.
- Continue the South Carolina Teaching Evaluation process with the use of Student Learning Objectives which are content-specific, grade level learning objectives that are measurable, focused on growth in student learning, and aligned to curriculum standards.
- Continue in weekly collaborative grade level groups to plan and develop instructional units to address the SC College and Career Ready Standards and student needs.
- Continue to correlate ELA and math MAP, iReady, and state testing data to determine specific ELA and math standards strengths and weaknesses.
- Continue to use a PBIS program to reward academic and positive behavior.
- Participate in and implement research-based staff development to improve teaching practices in ELA and math.
- Provide parents with opportunities to meet/speak with staff members during reasonable hours, to participate in school activities, and to observe classroom activities.
- Establish lines of communication with parents through School Messenger, Ed-Line Webpages, Peachjar, weekly telephone calls, and conferences.
- Implement social and emotional support in classes to improve outcomes for the whole child using the PATHS Program.
- Continue to implement the Multi-Tiered System of Support (MTSS) for all students. MTSS will be used to improve Tier 1, Tier II, and Tier III instruction for all students and to problem-solve for students who need additional support academically, socially, and or emotionally.
- Maintain a school climate which is safe and conducive to learning.
