# PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Alston Middle School prides itself on serving as a pillar of the Summerville community. Through historical ties and strong community connections, active parental involvement, and a distinguished staff, AMS works to provide each individual child with the tools needed so that he or she will become a productive citizen. This vision is brought to life on a daily basis through the diversity of our programs and through the quality of our teachers. As we look to the future, AMS is prepared to take on the challenges that the new SCREADY state testing system will bring. We embrace the need to develop a curriculum and school structures that will prepare students to be both college and career ready as well as provide them the knowledge, skills, and personal characteristics needed to be successful in the 21<sup>st</sup> century.

During the 2015-2016 school year, Alston stakeholders worked together to provide rigorous standards in all four core areas as well as in Fine/Related Arts classes. We provided these with the goal to foster career and college readiness. Gifted and Talented Education classes were offered in all core subject areas in all grade levels. In order to promote high school graduation, students were able to take Algebra 1, Geometry, English 1 Honors, Spanish, and Fine Arts classes, providing them with high school credits. In addition, Read 180, Math 180, and Academic Core Extension (ACE) were utilized as tools to support students in core classes. The Alston guidance department met with eighth grade students to create Individualized Graduation Plans (IGPs), focusing on the college and/or career path of each student.

Alston students also consistently displayed the world class skills that make them globally competitive. Alston students displayed creativity and innovation by participating in Fine Arts performances, competing in the Reflections contest, anchoring the student news broadcast (WAMS), and taking Gateway to Technology classes. Students also demonstrated critical thinking and problem solving skills which were fostered through competitions such as Quest, MathCounts!, Dimension U, Robotics, First Lego League, the AMS Spelling Bee, and the AMS Geography Bee. Many students earned placed positions in these competitions and continued on the district and state levels! In addition, students utilized the PathBlazer program to facilitate computer-based differentiated instruction and Document-Based Questions (DBQs) to assist in higher-order thinking.

The AMS team of parents, students, teachers, administrators, community members, and business partners epitomize the power of successful collaboration. Through Professional Learning Communities (PLCs), teachers and

administrators met to ensure the best education for each child. AMS students were supported by the surrounding community in athletic and academic events. The teamwork of Alston stakeholders continued with committees such as the Positive Behavioral Intervention and Supports (PBIS) committee, the Parent Teacher Student Association (PTSA), the School Improvement Council (SIC), and the Health and Wellness Committee.

Communication continued throughout the 2015-2016 school year through the avenues of newsletters, media, and technology. AMS students utilized WAMS to update the student body on school events. In addition, Alston's new website Edline was utilized to provide stakeholders electronic copies of the monthly newsletter, school updates, and classroom happenings. Parents were kept informed via Remind (text messaging service), school emails, and the AMS phone messages.

Alston Middle School congratulates its faculty for providing students numerous opportunities to develop metacognitive skills. The guidance department worked as a cohesive unit providing classroom lessons, small-group and individual counseling, and trainings for students on how to take an active leadership/ mentorship role with new and incoming students. Alston continued character building and goal setting with all students through its PBIS program. Teachers at AMS provided tutoring opportunities in addition to the after school Tiger Time program. Our media specialist worked with classroom teachers to provide lessons for students on specific standards and test taking skills.

Developing life and career characteristics is essential for all Alston students to become productive citizens. That is why AMS strived to instill integrity and self-direction in students through its character development program and career speakers, who were specifically geared toward the desires of each student. Alston displayed a global perspective through providing Spanish classes joining stakeholders in "Coffee with the Principal" meetings, hosting a food pantry for community members, and participating in the "Principal for a Day" program. Perseverance and work ethic was rewarded through academic ceremonies and rewards. Students were honored with Gold Club memberships for excelling in academics and character.

The Alston Middle School team feels confident that each child has demonstrated growth in the areas of academics and character,. Our SC Absolute Rating of "Excellent", our Palmetto Gold Award, and our numerous Fine Arts and athletic achievements confirm the commitment given by all stakeholders to ensure the success of all students.
