STEM Club

The STEM club was very busy this year with various activities including astronomy nights, ARRL Annual Spring School Radio Club Contact Contest, and the school's garden. The STEM Club is the only continuously running club at DMS for the last 18 years as it started as K4DMS and the Wildcat Astronomy Club back in 2004.

Engaging Creative Minds

The 8th grade Social Studies department had the opportunity to partner with the Charleston Museum through Engaging Creative Minds. A curator from the museum took our eighth graders back in time to colonial Charleston. The classes started off by playing a board game where students took on the roles of reallife colonial Charlestonians and had to navigate their way through colonial society. Students also had the opportunity to examine and analyze a variety of primary sources from the museum's collection to learn a little bit more about what life was like for South Carolina's enslaved individuals. The curator shared with the students the story of Dave the Potter, a famous enslaved potter whose who left clues about his day-to-day life in the poems he used to inscribe on his pots. The Charleston Museum has the nation's largest collection of Dave the Potter's work. Students were able to finish off their experience by creating a clay pot of their own!

During the last week of January and the first week of February, 6th grade students, in conjunction with Engaging Creative Minds, created their own artistic interpretation of Bubonic Plague mask. The design reflected the authenticity of the mask used during the Bubonic Plague of the Middle Ages. Students participated in all stages of the design and creation of the masks. This opportunity allowed students to use engineering problem solving skills in collaboration with their peers. At the end, students presented their projects to the class and reflected on the mask making process.

Financial Literacy Student Wins Color the Concepts

Preston Frame was named one of the 16 winners for the Color the Concepts Calendar Contest sponsored by the SC Council on Economic Education. Over 600 students in grades K-8 were challenged with illustrating one of ten concepts which are outlined in the South Carolina Social Studies Standards.

DMS Media Center

The DMS Media Center was fully open for the 2021-2022 school year! In addition to checking out books and teaching lessons to students, technology is also managed out of the media center. The DMS 20 Book Challenge was created for students to promote reading a variety of books, with monthly prizes awarded for logging books in a virtual form. A celebration will be held in early May for students who complete the challenge. An in-person book club, Wildcat Readers, was established for the first time since Covid-19 for all grade levels.
