We honor our country's men and women who bravely offer their lives for the preservation of our nation's freedoms. Through PLC's and data team meetings teachers collaborate to analyze units, student data, and reading, writing, and mathematical strategies to provide student choice, increase student engagement, and determine appropriate interventions for students. Teachers & students also collaborate to set goals & develop action plans.

SC Ready ELA scores slightly increased in grades 3-5 in the number of students meeting or exceeding standards, while Math scores slightly decreased. While our focus for reading and math intervention was in the primary grade levels, in order to increase our student achievement in the upper grade levels, targeted interventions may be needed for students in grades 3-5 as well.

Curriculum development improved school wide as teachers collaborated to develop unit plans using the UbD template created by the district. PLC meetings were devoted to modeling and practicing this process, and teachers used the UbD rubric to self-assess and peer assess. Professional development focused mainly on Stage 1 development and ensuring that the assessments in Stage 2 demonstrated alignment with the goals. This is an on-going process, and we will continue to refine our alignment of Stages 1 and 2 and increase the number of units developed during the "2018-2019" school year. We will continue to incorporate research based writing strategies within the units.

State Performance Tests

This spring, students in Grades 3, 4, and 5 will be administered the *SC READY* state test in *ELA-Writing*; *ELA-Reading*; *and Mathematics*. In mid-May, students in 4th Grade will be given the *SCPASS* state test in *Science* and students in 5th Grade will take the *SCPASS Social Studies* test.
