A Message From the Principal:

This report is based on our state testing results from the spring of 2013. We have made great strides with improving student achievement. Our focus for the 2012-2013 school year was on math and this is the area that showed the most improvement, with our mean score increasing for every subgroup. The addition of early morning tutoring and small group math instruction contributed to this increase.. When looking at longitudinal data, we see some increases for ELA. However, there was a decrease in our male, African-American, disabled and subsidized meals subgroups for ELA.. With the continued support of our RTI interventionists and with the addition of Reading Recovery for struggling 1st grade readers, we hope to see more gains in the ELA area over the next few years. The professional development provided through our TAP program and Master Teacher is providing key strategies and a common academic language that is providing more consistency between our classrooms and curriculum.

Our theme for the 2013-14 school year has been "Imagine it...Dream it....Make it Happen!" Please join us in encouraging our students to imagine what they will become in the future. Help them to establish goals, to develop a strong work ethic, and to work toward achieving those goals so their dreams will become a reality. Our college and career readiness standards are more rigorous and require our students to think critically and to apply learning into new situations. Getting the most out of available educational opportunities takes effort and dedication. We encourage parental involvement and value your input in all aspects of your child's education. This includes volunteering, reading with your child and helping with assigned homework, attending parent meetings and conferences, participating in school functions, and stressing the importance and value of an education within your home.

We believe that all students, regardless of their cultural background, have the right to an education in order to become independent, responsible citizens and to achieve their full potential.



Instructional Programs

Our elementary school serves students in the four-year-old child development program through fifth grade. The child development program is a full-day program staffed by a full-time, early childhood certified teacher and a teaching assistant. The child development classrooms accommodate young children's needs for active participation, both physically and spatially. The children are able to interact socially, as well as engage in problem solving and language development activities. Special family nights are held to discuss activities associated with the various units and what you can do to help your child at home.

Kindergarten is a full-day program taught by an early childhood certified teacher with the assistance of an instructional aide. The emphasis is focused on the child and teaching at the appropriate developmental level. Classroom communities are positive, supportive, and based on a hands-on approach for engaging learners.

In all classrooms, emphasis is placed on integrating subject matter, critical thinking skills, and problem solving. Our students weekly classes in art, music, physical education and computerassisted instruction, as well as use of the Media Center, enrich the instructional program.

WEP strives to meet the educational needs of all students. In meeting this concept, we recognize the unique characteristics of gifted children. Students in this program are served daily by a certified, GT endorsed teacher. Children with special needs are served by teachers who are trained to meet their needs. They are mainstreamed into general education as much as possible. Response to intervention is helping to identify students who are struggling and who need more intensive help than a classroom teacher can provide. We have two interventionists who work with these children. When we catch them early, students show improvement and often rebound from their deficits.
