A Message from the Principal:

The SC Department of Education recently released the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) ratings for all schools. The federal ESEA waiver encourages equal access to education and holds schools and districts accountable for academic achievement of all students, including difficulties, poverty, and students learning English as a second language. We are proud to announce that W. E. Parker Elementary School received the highest rating of all the schools in the Edgefield County School District for the second year in a row earning a rating of an "A".

Over the last three years we have been climbing the ladder of success. In 2012, we were a "B" with an 81. In 2013 we increased to an 88.4. In 2014 we increased by 8.4 points to an "A". We have made tremendous strides in closing the achievement gap between our subgroups over the last three years. As a result, we have been named a 2014-2015 Title I Reward School for Performance. Reward Schools for Performance are the highest performing Title I schools in a given year. To be named a Reward School for Performance a Title I school must have attained an "A" or "B" in the two most recent school years, have a free/reduced lunch count that is greater than 50 percent, not have significant achievement gaps, and have least one tested grade on state assessments.

In addition, W. É. Parker has also been named a Reward School for Progress. To be named a Reward School for Progress, a Title I school must: have attained an "A", "B", or "C" in the two most recent school years, have a free/reduced lunch count that is greater than 50 percent, be one of the top ten percent of qualifying Title I schools that demonstrate progress in the performance of ALL students or in subgroups on statewide assessments or make substantial progress increasing the graduation rate, and have at least one tested grade on state assessments. Schooldigger.com ranks W.E. Parker Elementary as 107 out of 568 SC schools for the 2013-14 school year, up from 225 in the previous year. It shows us as the second most improved school in the state! This site is often viewed by businesses and industries as well as people choosing to make moves to the area.

Preparing our Children for the Real World the Right Way has been our district's motto for the last three years, and these accomplishments are evidence that W. E. Parker is doing just that. As leader of this wonderful school, I am so proud of our hardworking teachers and all of our staff. We have a dedicated team who truly care about each individual child. Instructional Programs

Our elementary school serves students in the four-year-old child development program through fifth grade. The child development program is a full-day program staffed by a full-time, early childhood certified teacher and a teaching assistant. The child development classrooms accommodate young children's needs for active participation, both physically and spatially. The children are able to interact socially, as well as engage in problem solving and language development activities. Special family nights are held to discuss activities associated with the various units and what you can do to help your child at home.

Kindergarten is a full-day program taught by an early childhood certified teacher with the assistance of an instructional aide. The emphasis is focused on the child and teaching at the appropriate developmental level. Classroom communities are positive, supportive, and based on a hands-on approach for engaging learners.

In all classrooms, emphasis is placed on integrating subject matter, critical thinking skills, and problem solving. Our students weekly classes in art, music, physical education and computerassisted instruction, as well as use of the Media Center, enrich the instructional program.

WEP strives to meet the educational needs of all students. In meeting this concept, we recognize the unique characteristics of gifted children. Students in this program are served daily by a certified and endorsed teacher. Children with special needs are served by teachers who are trained to meet their needs. They are mainstreamed into general education as much as possible. Response to intervention is helping to identify students who are struggling and who need more intensive help than a classroom teacher can provide. We have two interventionists who work with these children. When we catch them early, students show improvement and often rebound from their deficits.
