-Full day 4K classes serving 40 children

PBIS and the "House System"

We believe that Positive Behavior Intervention and Support (PBIS) is key to helping young children learn appropriate behaviors for school. Through the consistent reinforcement of school-wide expectations, positive behaviors become the focus.

This year OWES implemented the "House System", patterned after a similar system being used at the "Ron Clark Academy" in Atlanta. All students spun the wheel to determine which house they would be in; all houses are a combination of all grade levels from 5K—5th grade. Each house has a unique mascot, color and character trait associated with it. Houses meet 2x monthly to learn more about these traits and plan service learning projects. Students earn points for their House by being caught meeting expectations, getting good grades and attendance and participating in school activities. Each month a House is identified as the overall point winner and is honored with a trophy and recognition at the monthly community meeting of all houses.

This system has really helped to improve student behavior and create a feeling of belonging and school spirit.
