Our Goals - 2022 - 2023 School Year

Using data from our 2022 Annual SC School Report Card, our SC READY Statewide Assessments and our AdvancEd Survey information, our SIC Team developed the following goals for the 2022-2023 School Year.

GOAL 1: <u>We will foster a school environment and hold high standards that push our Warriors to show significant</u> growth on our SC Ready Statewide Assessments.

We expect the progress made by students at WMS to reflect the projections below

Ultimately, our goal is to achieve 80% proficiency in the above assessments within the next four years.

GOAL 2: <u>100% of our Professional Staff will receive appropriate staff development that is designed to enhance student achievement</u>.

A characteristic of any high-achieving school is preparing the staff to address the data-driven needs of our students and target direct instruction. Throughout the 2022-2023 year, our teaching staff attended weekly PLCs where teachers were guided through data analysis and identified the strategies and instruction needed with the support of our Instructional Coach. In addition, our administration and professional staff had the opportunity to attend meaningful educational conferences. When our teachers are at their best—they will be at their best for our students.

GOAL 3: <u>The percentage of meaningful feedback from our Community and Parent Survey will increase from 55% to 90% within the next four years AND our parent/family satisfaction rate will increase from 68% to 85% within the next four years.</u>

Without meaningful feedback from our stakeholders, parents, and community members, our school cannot properly address the needs of our students. We plan on communicating with and involving all stakeholders using the following activities: Back to School Orientation tours; Vision, Data, and iReady Night; technology education sessions for parents and guardians; increasing positive teacher-to-home communication with the use of positive post-cards; utilizing technology to keep parents and families informed on student progress; keeping our school's social media accounts and newsletters current with the achievements of our students and the great things happening at WMS.

Our Challenges - 2022 - 2023 School Year

The challenges faced by our community are also shared by our students and staff. At Waccamaw Middle School, we truly believe that the strength of our school contributes to the strength of our community. We have recognized and identified academic and social deficits within our student body resulting from the challenges in education over the past few years.

Using iReady diagnostic assessments, Mastery Connect benchmarks, and standards-based assessments we have been able to identify the skill and content gaps present within our student body. We have utilized classroom and schoolwide small-group interventions, "Study Buddies,"- an intervention for students with failing quarter grades, department based strategies and high-impact tutoring to address the content and skill gaps identified this year.

The needs of our Warriors do not stop at academics. We are doing our utmost to address mental health concerns as well as establishing appropriate behaviors expected in a school setting. During the 2022-2023 School Year, we have implemented a school-wide PBIS system as well as a whole-school book study of <u>Starfish</u> during Anti-Bullying Month. We will continue to provide Social/Emotional Learning lessons and PBIS programs that address the needs of Waccamaw Middle Students.
