- Miss Ruby's Kids—Community resource that provides enrichment opportunities and gives individual attention to our students.
- WOW Stamps—Comprehensive plan to reward positive student behavior.
- WMS Mentor Program—Community members forming meaningful relationships with our at-risk population.
- WMS High School Mentor Program— High School students in a leadership class work with our students to prepare them for high school and beyond.
- WMS ProTeam—Students who exhibit the potential for success working toward the skills needed to complete college and consider education as a viable career option and to expand the pool of minority and male teachers available to the public schools of SC.
