Our vision is to create a culture in which the school and community foster **academic excellence** and the **social development** of all students in a **safe and inviting environment**.


Academic Excellence: This year, two curriculum nights were held to help incoming freshmen and all upperclassmen plan for registration and college. The SIC began to solicit professionals to augment the CARE tutoring program.

Social Development: Student Government completed a survey indicating that student interests in volunteer activities were more aligned with long-term and career-centric opportunities. Mrs. CHS pageants include mentoring and highlight student accomplishments. Mentoring programs for boys and girls are growing. Boys' and Girls' Club partnerships include free membership at CROC center. Partnership with Edwin Penland (marketing firm) exposes marketing class to marketing use of social media.

Safe & Inviting Environment: More student accomplishments are displayed on the walls and web-site than ever before. Quarterly recognition continues for attendance and academics.

improvement ideas were generated, but our core team is small; we especially need bilingual participants to be able to meet and work in two languages (English/Spanish).



According to the latest school report card:

- The Algebra I End-of-Course passing rate scores have declined by 15.7%.
- The Biology I End-of-Course passing rate scores have declined by 23%,.
- The English I End-of-Course passing rate scores have declined by 11.5%.
- The US History End-of-Course passing rate scores have declined by 3.3%.
- Graduation rate continues to improve, from 48.8% in 2010 to 55.8% in 2011, to 58.7% in 2012, and 62.4% in 2013.
- Carolina posted a 70.6% graduation rate for 2014.

Demographics indicate that 93.75% of students are from families living below the poverty index; 84.3% receive free or reduced lunch.

Attendance had declined since 2010 (730 students) to 2011 (680 students) and 2012 (678 students). There were slight increases in 2013 (693) and 2014 (718).

The absolute rating for Carolina High School improved from "below average" to "average", and the growth rating improved from "below average" to "excellent".

CHS families can participate by

- encouraging student participation in CHS tutoring and other programs that focus on improvement of reading.
