Common Core Standards: Wade Hampton is Ready!

The idea for the Common Core State Standards (CCSS) started in 2009 as a states-led initiative to create consistent standards and expectations of students. It was an effort to ensure a coherent rigorous underpinning for students' entrance into college or the workforce and to ease student transitions between districts. The Council of State School Officers and the National Governors Association, with input from teachers, parents, and other stakeholders. developed these standards to address the wide discrepancy between districts in student expectations and graduation requirements. The standards have been voluntarily adopted by 45 states that recognize the benefit of providing challenging, coherent, clear, and consistent expectations across our population, regardless of zip code and the need to prepare students for competition in an increasingly global, economic environment. Much like the current SC State Standards provide teachers with a guideline of what students should be expected to know in each subject and grade level, the CCSS provides that guidance across the states that have adopted it.


The CCSS was approved as South Carolina's academic standards on July 14, 2010. Since then the Greenville County School District's Division of Academics has been working diligently to target and bridge gaps between the current State Standards and the CCSS and to establish curricula based on the new standards. Full implementation of the CCSS in ELA and Math is targeted for next school year, 2014-2015.

Wade Hampton began preparing as soon as the state standards were adopted in 2010. The CCSS content standards are in place for English Language Arts and Math only. All other content areas will continue to use the SC State Content Standards. The CCSS influence the other content areas in the form of Literacy Standards. Professional development has been ongoing, beginning with book studies the first year on collaborative teaching methods. With the help of the district, the administration and teachers have been researching the standards to understand fully what they are, what they mean and the best way for students to be assessed. The CCSS focuses very strongly on a student's ability to read, to determine relevant information, to write, and to apply his or her skills. As a result, teaching will emphasize

logic and critical thinking. As is the practice at Wade Hampton, everyone has gone above and beyond the bare minimum. Teachers and administration have taken sample assessments in an effort to comprehend more fully the skills a student will need to be successful in the CCSS assessments. Throughout the current year, students have been participating weekly in "close reading" activities in each classroom. These involve reading a prepared text on a subject, and by using specific close-reading strategies to comprehend and ascertain relevant information, the student gleans information that can be used to support a response to assessment questions. During this Bridge Year, everyone involved is doing double duty. The
