Student Achievement

- Berea Middle had an Absolute Rating of Average and an Improvement Rating of Average.
- The passage rate for End-of-Course testing for Algebra I was 100%.
- Berea Middle was the only Greenville County Title I middle school that attained an Average Improvement and Absolute Rating on the School Report Card.
- Berea Middle met 16 out of 29 objectives as defined by Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP).
- The percentage of students fluent in the four basic operations with whole numbers increased due to the implementation of the Reflex Learning program.
- The percentage of students meeting the targeted growth score on MAP in the areas of Reading and Math increased in all grade levels from the 2011 to the 2012 school year.

Additional Information

Berea Middle is a suburban middle school located in the northwest quadrant of Greenville County. Our middle school serves students in grades six, seven and eight. During the 2011-2012 year, the school enrolled approximately 750 students and employed 77 staff members, including professional and para-professional staff.

Significant challenges to Berea Middle School included

- lower enrollment which resulted in a loss of teachers, and an increase in the student-teacher ratio:
- a transient population which resulted in students lacking content not taught at the previous school or repeating content that had already been taught; and
- decreased funding which resulted in fewer resources available for professional development and other activities.
