Sterling's School Improvement
Council (SIC) has been working hard this
year to help shape the direction of
Sterling. The following report outlines
much of what has been done this year
and summarizes much of what has been
accomplished by the students and faculty
of Sterling as well.

Sterling has had a wonderful year.

We started off with a special visit from
Subway's Jared Fogle as part of the
Subway Challenge and to promote our
CATCH and Culinary Creations food
program. The fall brought in a record
amount of needed funds through a great
PTA Boosterthon fundraiser and the

awarding of a \$39,474 grant from State Farm to support safer walking and biking to school and in the community.

We have had excellent parent participation and inclusiveness in the school through a variety of PTA meeting formats as well as monthly Lunch and Learns from our guidance department and media center. We have also begun parent orientations for the next grade level well before the end of the year to more fully prepare parents for the school year to come.

Lastly, we have continued to improve the instructional program at Sterling. Every grade level and area has

Progress UPDATE

GOAL Areal: Raising the Academic Challenge through 2012-13.

The targets in the circle represent a 5% gain from the 2011-2012 scores for all Sterling program students taking PASS.

Goal Area I encompasses performance goals for Reading, Writing and Math. These performance targets are based on the prior year's PASS scores and are focused on areas needing improvement. Within the plan found in this document, interim performance goals further target additional areas of improvement. You may notice in this goal area that Sterling program is designated rather than Sterling School. Sterling program indicates elementary students in grades 3rd-5th not in the Charles Townes Center. This designation is due to the extremely high number of Charles Townes students who score exemplary in English Language Arts, Writing and Math.

Strategies:

- ✓ Develop periodic <u>school-wide enrichment and extensions for all students</u> based on individual student interests and aptitude.
 - 4K-5th Grade developed and implemented cross grade level enrichment days in the fall and spring. Students chose sessions based on interest rather than grade or age level.
- ✓ Develop and implement extensions and/or acceleration for identified individual students based on strengths in subject or concept, regardless of grade.
 - Students from across all grade levels and both programs have participated in direct extensions by our Enrichment Facilitator or other staff members.

Experiential Learning

The school seeks to encourage students and teachers to engage in the learning process in a manner that allows for learning from and through failure, risk taking and trial and error.

This may be synonymous with the current approach of inquiry based learning, as many of the characteristics are seen in current teaching. However, there is a desire to see this encouraged and emphasized.

Inclusiveness

The school seeks to create an environment in which students, teachers, parents and community members feel accepted and part of the school. This focus seeks to value these roles and to appreciate and value the differences that each individual brings in fulfilling his or her role.

√Rewrite & modify our current instructional program & assessments: specifically Middle School and Math.

• The middle school curriculum was rewritten and is in its first draft. The Charles Townes Center math scope and sequence has been rewritten and is being implemented. Each grade level in the Sterling Program continues to develop and review the program of study for the Sterling Elementary Program. Sterling teachers at each grade level have met with Dr. Sparkman (District Support) and Ms. Foulkes (Sterling's Instructional Coach) to refine and rewrite these units.

The development of school-wide and individual enrichment and acceleration addresses expanding the experiential nature and focus of our school at the individual level. Inclusiveness will also be addressed by considering individual student interests and addressing them directly. Teachers and administrators will continue to refine, rewrite and expand the inquiry-based units of the Sterling Program and course selections at the middle school level.

Goal Area 2: Ensure Quality Personnel in All Positions

PERFORMANCE GOAL: All personnel will be highly qualified and specialized through 2012-13.

Goal Area 2 addresses the need for quality staff. The Sterling School vision requires extensive training for teachers and staff members. All teachers in both programs have or will have Gifted and Talented certification and every staff member will receive extensive diversity training. This area defines the school-wide professional development for the year as well.

Strategies:

- **★ Develop electronic student portfolios.**
 - Middle School is digitizing conferencing process using Moodle.
- * Redevelop middle school courses and intermediate elementary to middle math curriculum.
 - Curriculum rewrite is complete and Program of Study is in its first draft.
 - CTC Math has been rewritten and is being implemented. Monthly support meetings are being held.
- ★ Develop and implement a school-wide enrichment program.
 - Completed successfully.
- **★Implement and support the CATCH program.**
 - · Monthly activities are presented to teachers for classroom use.
- **★ Continue diversity training.**
 - Poverty tour and seminar completed in the fall.
- **★Continue intra-staff sharing of best practices.**
 - · Completed fall intra-staff sharing of best practices
 - Spring not scheduled yet
- ★ Continue cross-grade and cross-program observations by teachers.
 - Winter intra-grade observations scheduled

Goal Area 3: Provide a School Environment Supportive of Learning

PERFORMANCE GOAL: Maintain or exceed 85% approval rating from students, parents and teachers on the State Report Card Survey.

<u>Goal Area 3</u> addresses school climate. This goal area is very important at Sterling School and is directly aligned with the focus of inclusiveness. Sterling School is a diverse school covering a wide range of ages and student needs. Sterling School plays a critical role in the local community. The strategies for meeting and maintaining this goal are designed to identify and meet the needs of this diverse population.

Strategies:

- ★ Develop and implement parent workshops and orientations to address student developmental and academic needs.
 - · Monthly Lunch and Learns scheduled through guidance and the media center.
- ★Create a new family/student inclusion/orientation program.
 - All grade level are hosting "Roll-up" Meetings with parents for next year in the spring to provide information for the coming year before the summer.
- * Redevelop parent-teacher conferencing to compliment the developing student portfolio.
 - Conferences have been held. We continue to work on supporting information that can better help parents understand student levels and performance.

Test Scores:

The PASS scores reported on the South Carolina Department of Education Report Card show combined scores of both programs. As a School Improvement Council, we look at the scores by program to ensure quality achievement for both programs in the school.

We continue to watch for trends and build consistency across all areas tested. We also want to see continued student improvement in 3rd, 4th and 5th grades. Sterling elementary students made some positive gains as well as showed some areas that still need improvement. The Sterling Program has so few students per grade level, we see swings in percentages based on just a few students.

Charles Townes students have continued to post a high percentage of Exemplary scores. This year showed many historical highs. These levels of achievement are the highest in South Carolina.

- Assessment: Develop curriculum continuums, portfolios and other assessment strategies to better evaluate and communicate student growth and progress.
- Balanced Literacy: Finding better ways to meaningfully engage students in reading.
