

2017 - 2018 Summary to the Community

Enoree Career Center is located in Northern Greenville County, south of Travelers Rest. The center was built in 1973, and a four million dollar renovation was completed during the 2005 school year. A new addition was completed in April of 2018 and houses classroom and lab space for the Machine Tool, Welding Technology, and Culinary Arts Programs.

Enoree Career Center serves students from four feeder high schools: Berea, Carolina, Travelers Rest, and Wade Hampton. Students from other high schools may elect to attend the center for specialized career center courses not offered at neighboring centers.

The programs and courses offered at Enoree include Automotive Collision Repair, Automotive Service Technology, Building Construction, Cosmetology, Culinary Arts, Firefighting, Law Enforcement, Graphic Communications, Machine Tool Technology, and Welding Technology. Additionally, Enoree Career Center offers a Career Academy program for ninth grade students who want to learn more about career options and learning opportunities at the career centers.

Other highlights and achievements of our programs include:

- Culinary Arts students won several competitions this year, including the district's Culinary Cook-off.
- Enoree students earned the highest number of industry certifications since the school adopted the year-long class schedule three years ago.
- Enoree's Career Academy served over 50 ninth-grade students from Travelers Rest, Berea, and Wade Hampton High Schools.
- Enoree seniors took part in a Job Fair in March 2018, and multiple students earned high school credit while also gaining valuable experience with local businesses through our Work-based Learning Program.
- Enoree began its Machine Tool Technology program in January of 2018 with five students.
- Enoree Career Center gained 100% Participation Status with the SkillsUSA organization.
- Enoree hosted many community partners and events, including the highly publicized Michelin Scholar Signing Day, and the Public Education Partners Board Meeting.
- Culinary Instructor Holly Bell was named "Culinary Educator of the Year" by the South Carolina Restaurant Association.
- Welding instructor Jamie Walden earned certification as an American Welding Society inspector at the AWS training center in Ohio.
- Twenty-two Enoree students competed in the State SkillsUSA competition.
- Five Enoree students were medalists in the State SkillsUSA competition, with three students earning a trip to the SkillsUSA National Leadership Conference and Competition in Louisville, Kentucky.
- Enoree students participated in various service projects including a canned food drive for two local food banks, assistance at local elementary schools and an early childhood center, and fund raisers for the Leukemia/Lymphoma Society.
- Twenty Enoree seniors were inducted into the National Technical Honor Society and were awarded regalia to be worn during graduation.
- Second-year cosmetology students yielded a 100% passage rate on the South Carolina State Board of Cosmetology Exam this spring.
- Enoree will name an Outstanding Student of the Year and a Greenville Tech Scholar Award for each program, each to be recognized at the district Completer Ceremony on May 31, 2018.

The school's theme for the 2016-17 school year was "Let's get to work!" The motto was two-fold, stressing the importance of maintaining a strong, positive work ethic, and also highlighting the career center's overall goal of helping students be employable and successful adults. Our continuing goal is to provide instruction and work-based experiences that provide students with advantages in their next steps, including entering the work-force, the military, and continuing their education in a post-secondary environment.
