Percent of Student PASS Records Matched for Purpose of Computing Growth Rating



Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

2011 was another fantastic year for the teachers and students at Brunson Elementary. Brunson Elementary received the Palmetto Silver award for academic performance in 2011. Brunson Elementary students have traditionally done well in academics, and had a strong fine arts program, but the Arts in the Basic Curriculum grant has enabled our students to go beyond the typical elementary school fine arts curriculum. The ABC grant has helped us get artists-in-residence such as a contemporary dance teacher and drama instructors that direct productions like, "The Snow Queen" and "Wizard of Oz". Through the hard work of our dedicated teachers, students worked with dance and drama artists-in-residence on four theatrical productions. Our annual dessert theater is always an anticipated production with polished performances from our talented students.

Brunson Elementary Steel Drum Band under the direction of our music teacher performed on a number of occasions, as well as the Brunson Elementary School Chorus.

Hampton School District One was recently awarded a 21st Century After School Grant that provided additional funding for Brunson Elementary teachers to help tutor students before and after school. This grant enabled students to continue to participate in drama, chorus, music, art, and robotics after school, in addition to academic tutoring. During the tutoring sessions, students focused on the basic skills in Math and ELA for a better understanding of their class work, while furthering their academics.

The Exxon/Mobile grant provided student incentives for things such as "Warrior Buck" celebrations. This positive behavior program focused on rewarding good behavior. Pizza, pencils, ribbons, stickers, and other incentives were available for students who did well in class.

Brunson Elementary teachers received several Bright Ideas grants for math and science supplies. We are currently in the second year with the Teacher and Student Advancement Program and the teachers and students are becoming much more comfortable with this rigorous instructional approach. This research based program uses ongoing staff development of the best practices in education. Brunson Elementary is able to employ two Master teachers to constantly guide teachers in instruction and keep track of student achievement. Our PTO has been actively involved the entire school year and with numerous fund raising activities, such as the fall festival, we have been able to make improvements to the school. Just this past year a basketball court was added to the playground through the efforts of community and parent volunteers. One of the biggest reasons Brunson Elementary students have been so successful in academics and the arts is the continued support of local businesses and our parents.

ESEA/Federal Accountability Rating System

In July 2012, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
