The mission of Estill Middle School is to prepare students to be successful, responsible citizens by providing challenging educational experiences in a safe, positive environment. We are definitely making strides to ensure that all our students are well-rounded in all areas of academia. As we reach the end of a great year this feels like a great time to reflect on some of the many positives regarding our school and community while highlighting a few areas of opportunity.

First and foremost, all of us here at EMS; students, faculty and staff, genuinely appreciate the generosity and support for our school and our community. In many communities, where education is viewed as a luxury, and not an investment, schools and teachers don't enjoy the tremendous support that we do here in our community. For this, we are most grateful. This has been a good year as the vast majority of our students worked hard and took advantage of the educational opportunities provided for them. It has been impressive to walk into classrooms and see creative teaching strategies being utilized in order to provide opportunities for students to interact with each other and become engaged in the learning process.

This year we have continued to modify our approach to instruction in keeping with the expectations outlined in the Common Core Curriculum, which essentially recommends that students spend more time learning fewer concepts but at a much deeper level of rigor and cognition. While there are those who bemoan the incursion of technology into our lives there is no doubt it is here to stay, and it's therefore incumbent on us to provide our students, and their teachers, with technological resources aimed at enriching their learning experiences. Our students continue to have access to a wide range of tech tools, from iPads and laptops to smartboards, to study buddies and Kindles.

It's worth mentioning that at no time have we envisioned utilizing technology as a substitute for good teaching, but rather as an essential component of 21st century education, a critical life skill. For teaching to be considered effective in 2014 technology simply needs to be part of the picture, and not viewed as an add-on. I do believe that it is time to move away from viewing technology as a supplement, and rather as part of the core of how we teach. Of course, while it's great to have a wonderful, up to date facility with some of the latest technology, at the end of the day a school is only as good as its people: faculty, staff, administration, students, parents, families and friends, all of whom provide the essential components of a great community school. We recognize that we're always a work in progress, and will continue to strive toward excellence at all levels.

- Students were provided opportunities to practice reading at their designated independent reading level using the Direct Instruction model to target student weaknesses in reading. Students attended classes daily working on reading skills from phonics, word attack, and decoding.

Volunteers and Partnerships

- Parents and community members served as classroom helpers, chaper-ones, testing monitors, and School Improvement Council. (SIC) members. Thanks to all of our parents that volunteered.
- Advisors from USC Beaufort and USC Salkehatchie came and met with students from all grade levels for "College Day". They talked with students about the different college degrees, tuition, housing, and athletics programs.
- Speakers Mr. Green and Mr. White with "DJJ/C.H.O.I.C.E.S" also came on campus and worked with students on a six week curriculum. The focus of the curriculum was to help students make the right choices, follow rules, and citizenship. The curriculum consisted of ten weekly sessions lasting for an hour.
- Members from the "Operation Get Smart" team came and visited students. The team consisted of inmates from the state prison. They spoke with students about staying on the right track and the types of things can lead them to time behind bars. They told their own personal stories about the lives they lived prior to being sent to prison.
- Speakers with "The Choice Bus" came on campus and spoke to students about making the right choices about their education and their attitude. They had a bus that students went on that simulated what an actual jail cell looked like. Students could experience the tight spaces of a prison cell and what a typical day is like for an inmate.
- EMS partnered with Hampton1 on a math and science grant. Teachers received professional development in those areas.


Family Involvement
