## School Renewal Goals

Goal: Students will use varied strategies and learning styles to improve academic performance in English/Language Arts and Math as measured by various assessments. A major emphasis will be made in Communication Skills.
Teachers will use Dominie, PASS results, MAPS Testing, Student Reading Inventory, 100 Book Challenge, and classroom assessment to determine and plan for individual needs.
Higher level thinking activities will be provided in the classroom through Everyday Math, Open Court Reading, creative writing and Core Knowledge and Language for Learning.
Teachers will plan activities to address all learning styles through the multi-
ple intelligences. ple intelligences.
We will continue to infuse the arts in the curriculum.

Teachers will incorporate practice activities in PASS format which match state standards in daily instruction.
Teachers will be provided with professional development in multievel classroom instruction, multiple intelligences, alternative assessment tional planning, the five components of reading test results for instruc practice.
Writing across the curriculum will continue to be a focus.
Students will participate in Classworks to enhance learning.
Students in grades 3 will participate in Corrective Reading.
Reading Counts and Independent Reading time will be used to in -
crease students' reading for pleasure.
Teachers will utilize computers and technology to accelerate student learning through programs such as Classworks.
Goal: Students will use prior knowledge to problem solve and complete tasks in all curriculum areas. Thinking and Reasoning in math will be a major focus. Expanding and Integrating Knowledge in
science will be another area of focus.
Social Studies Standards will be used to plan for integration in ELA.
Everyday Math will be used to integrate Social Studies and Science

Students will be provided experiences in music that relate to classoom instruction.
Students will be provided activities in P.E. that are proven by research to improve reading and math
Students will develop portfolios at every grade level.
Goal: HSE will increase parental involvement in the participation of their child's education through school/home relations.
Activities such as Open House, scheduled conferences, scheduled PTO meetings, and performances are provided.
Parenting and curriculum workshops are provided.
A Volunteer program is organized. Parents in grades K-2 are encour aged to provide 30 hours of service through a Discovery Model School With-In A School focusing on the multiple intelligences.
Daily agendas, weekly newsletters and communication folders are provided.
Teachers will provide websites through the district e-chalk.
Student Assistance Teams meet regularly with parents about their child's progress and interventions. ( 84 meetings thus far)
Parent conferences will be student-led.
