At Gilbert High School, it is the expectation that teachers are lifelong learners. GHS has a fine faculty including 15 Nationally Board Certified teachers. The percentage of teachers who are on continuing contracts is up slightly at 80.6% even though our number of returning teachers went down from 87.9 to 85.7% due to a number of retirements and transfers. Our teachers are continually learning and improving their craft through weekly professional learning sessions that include training in technology. Expeditionary Learning. and literacy strategies. This year, they have had a number of learning opportunities led by special education teachers, guidance counselors and our ESOL teacher as well. Administrators have led professional learning sessions to prepare teachers for the new teacher evaluation system that will begin next year, as well as the Read to Succeed law that will require further coursework for all faculty members. GHS began the reporting of Habits of Scholarship progress for every student, so training was given to teachers to implement this. Becoming an Expeditionary Learning school, 55 of our teachers have had the opportunity to visit schools that are currently implementing the philosophy, practices, and structure of EL. Both teachers and administrators have participated in a number of offsite EL trainings, including two administrators joining a yearlong administrator's cohort, four teachers joining a yearlong coaching cohort, two administrators and two teacher leaders taking part in the EL National Conference, four teachers traveling to the EL Culture and Character Conference. Also to prepare for the changes associated with the EL philosophy, the faculty has participated in studying Ron Berger's book, Leaders of their Own Learning.

Making Our Mark



Gilbert High School student leadership chose the theme "Making our Mark" for 2014-15. Student Council really focused on school spirit this year. Activities included Homecoming, Veterans Day Program in collaboration with Fine Arts, Coming Home, Awards nights for Seniors and Underclassmen, and a Senior Celebration Day to Carowinds on May 28. A pep club was established this year to promote school spirit at athletic events. Also known as the "TRIBE", the pep club was not only fun to watch, but also fun to be a participant as they had a different theme each game and fostered a great deal of collaboration and planning among students. The Pep Club was even featured on a newscast one Friday night. Great senior activities include the Senior Handprint Wall, Teacher who most inspired the Class of 2015, Senior Breakfast, Senior Slide Show, Celebration of Excellence Host School, and a fabulous school wide video. We also have a monthly broadcast program that highlights great things that are happening at GHS and participate in social media via Facebook, Twitter, and Instagram.

As an Expeditionary Learning School, Gilbert High School has scheduled a designated time for students to participate in a culture and character class each week. Students interact with a small group led by a teacher, who serves as their Tribe Leader. The teacher will take an active role in monitoring your students academic, behavioral, and social progress while providing small group activities that challenge students to think critically and take active roles in their classrooms and communities. Focusing on culture, character, and leadership, Tribe Time encourages students to develop a cohesive clear vision for student learning. Tribe Time provides a place for GHS students to explore, share, create, make mistakes, reflect, learn, prepare, encourage, and celebrate. We are planning to change the name to CREW in 2015-16 and have the class everyday. Expeditionary Learning is a comprehensive, school wide partnership. A school improvement focus at Gilbert High School is to raise student SAT and ACT scores. I am pleased to report that we did raise our SAT composite score, which is reading and math, from 989 in 2013 to 1004 in 2014. Our ACT scores also increased from 20.8 in 2013 to 21.2 in 2014. Both are above the state and national averages. Gilbert High School contracted with *Attest* to have SAT/ACT workshops for our students. We continue to use Cambridge materials in our SAT/ACT prep class as well as test taking strategies integrated into teacher's instruction. We hosted one workshop this year in early spring. We also provided an ACT Boot Camp for all third year students in the spring to prepare for the April 28th administration of the ACT. Another focus is to educate our parents and students in which test is most appropriate to take in regards to what their plans are after graduation. (See right for test information). This information should be discussed in your child's Individual Graduation Plan (IGP) meeting scheduled annually through your guidance counselor. 
