HIGHLIGHTS FOR THE YEAR!

Family Reading Night: The students celebrated their literacy life in the classroom with their parents.

Red Ribbon Week: This year our focus was on making healthy choices and drug awareness. We had Heather Johnson from LRADAC do a puppet show with our K-2nd grade students and a presentation for our 3rd-5th graders in addition to the daily activities provide by our school counselors.

<u>Veteran's Day Assembly</u>: All students and staff members honored local Veterans in an assembly, and they were invited, prior to the event, to a breakfast held in the library.

Coats for Kids: The students collected coats for children in our area who were in need.

<u>Junior Achievement (JA)</u>: This year our 5th graders participated in a JA program titled <u>More</u> <u>Than Money</u>. Through this experience, the students focused on financial literacy, entrepreneurship, and workforce readiness. **Family Information Night**: Parents and community members were invited to attend break-out sessions on the following topics: technology, math, reading, social/emotional health, and drug awareness.

Lake Murray Polar Plunge: To raise money for Special Olympics, students put money in the bucket of the administrator they wanted to take the plunge. Somehow it ended in a three way tie, and we all took the plunge with our special education teachers!

<u>Jump Rope for Heart</u>: Students raised money for the Heart Association by being active and jumping rope.

FUND Run: The students raised money by running laps for books in our "Book Nook" in the library. These text will be used by teachers and students for guided reading and independent reading.

Adopt A Highway: Staff members have supported an effort to keep Wise Ferry Road litter free.

<u>Mentor "First-Mates" Program</u>: 34 students were matched with community members that served as mentors to encourage our students in different areas.

Band Aid Drive for the Children's Hospital: An idea led by on of our Mariners resulted in us collecting 378 boxes of decorative band aids.

Relay for Life: Throughout the year, the students raised money for the American Cancer Society through various events such as Sunglass Day, Hat Day, Tacky Day, and Crazy Sock Day. We also raised funds in the "You've Been Egged" activity, in which the students were able to buy an egg and give it to a friend, teacher, or parent.
