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# "Report to the People"

2011-2012

Twenty-First Century Learning has been the goal and the driving force for all our efforts at White Knoll High School during the 2011-12 school year. Through intense focus on communication, collaboration, critical thinking, and creativity, our faculty and staff members are providing students with the skills they will need as productive citizens after graduation. Our aim is to equip them with all the tools needed to succeed as global citizens in a world growing ever-smaller through the advances of technology and universal communication.

One giant step in that direction has been the roll-out this year of one-to-one computing. While technology is not the target, it is an invaluable tool to enable our students to reach their goals. Through wireless access to the internet throughout our building, students are able to do on-line research without the need of physically going to a computer lab. Our teachers are able to access teaching tools that enrich the learning environment in the classroom, and they are able to send and receive assignments from their students without the expense and waste of printing everything to a paper format. Students who are absent from the classroom for medical or other reasons can access their assignments and submit their work via websites and e-mails. Student presentations can be enhanced by the visual impact of still and movie photography. Student creativity can thrive in this digital environment.

Every department in the school has risen to the challenge of 21st Century Learning. In World Languages, students are focusing on "I Can" statements. They earn grades based on their ability to demonstrate specific skills in communication and understanding in the target language. Students use iPads to research and plan virtual travel experiences to countries throughout the world.

Special needs students are receiving assignments through e-mail and responding with attached documents and pictures. A biology teacher creates video tutorials to help her students study. Another teacher makes an assignment for his environmental science students to collaborate on research about threatened or endangered species in South Carolina. The students will then create posters or public service announcements to educate the public about what they have learned.

Literary Moves (dance) students research societal issues and blog their findings to discussion boards. They then choreograph dances to communicate their thoughts in response to their findings. Media

WKHS SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT

Arts students have been working with iMovie to develop their skills in filming and editing. An English teacher uses iPads to research several translations of the same literary work to analyze the impact of word choice on literary meaning.

Social studies students research other countries and times long past. Latin classes, using their iPads for research, are drawing comparisons from Homer's Iliad and Odyssey and creating modern skits and props about these ancient epics. A math teacher gives notes for her students to record electronically. She then e-mails a copy of the notes to students who are absent. In PE weightlifting classes students film each other to analyze proper weightlifting form and sometimes take assessments on-line.

Health Science students have access to an on-line book to supplement their regular textbook. It includes formative assessments that alert them and their teachers to any gaps in learning that may need to be filled in before the final assessment.

Orchestra students compose short pieces on their iPads using GarageBand to illustrate how artists in the music industry "sample" audio from other sources, then use those "samples" to create new compositions. Guitar students program their IPADS to play accompanying tracks along with themselves as they perform their guitar pieces.

As you can see, every department has risen to the challenge of providing 21st Century Learning.

An important part of the White Knoll High School effort to prepare students for the 21st century is the opening of our Center for Public Health and Advanced Medical Studies. The Center opened in the fall of 2011 with 68 qualified sophomores whose goals include acquiring at least a four-year degree in some area of medical study. Possible future careers for these students might include private practice as a medical doctor, medical researcher, nurse practitioner, pharmacist, medical administrator, public health official, etc. Guided by a highly qualified advisory board, this program has had a wonderfully successful opening year and will add a second cohort of students in the fall of 2012.

Two prestigious external groups validated the efforts of White Knoll High School after visiting on our campus this spring. In early April, representatives of AdvancEd spent a day on our campus as part of the Lexington One accreditation process. Later in April representatives of the national program Project Lead The Way (PLTW) were on campus. Both groups offered glowing evaluations of our programs, staff, and facilities. AdvancEd affirmed accreditation for Lexington County School District One and PLTW certified our Center program as a part of their national network, affirming that the classes we offer are rigorous and targeted to the needs of students seeking advanced study in the biomedical sciences.

A key component of the successes of WKHS is community support and involvement. Leading the cooperative effort of school/community collaboration, the School Improvement Council (SIC) and TE-PAIC have had the following goals for the 2011-12 school year:
