
Faculty and Staff Honors

I would like to thank each and every one of you for your continued support of Pleasant Hill Middle School. Our students and faculty are very fortunate to have such great support from parents and our community. I am especially grateful to the PTSA and all of its volunteers who have all done so much for our school. Fundraisers, "fun lunches," grade level dances, Cougar Carnival, and evening educational activities have all made a huge contribution to improve the climate at PHMS, as well as, raising significant monies for our school. The SIC is looking forward to partnering with the PTSA in years to come to continually improve PHMS and support its students and faculty.

This year, the SIC focused on improving our relationship with the faculty at PHMS, improving the climate of our school, evaluating the traffic and safety issues during the beginning and dismissal of school, and improving school to home communication.

We are proud of these specific accomplishments:

- Hosted a Candidate Forum prior to the November election for all School Board candidates with a large attendance from the community.
- Conducted a faculty survey with nearly 40% of the faculty and staff participating.
- Designed a PHMS SIC facebook page for sharing Legislative updates and SIC news and encouraged a large number of parents and staff to "like" us.
- Investigated a "safety audit" with SCDOT to evaluate traffic issues at dropoff and pickup of car riding students.
- Continued to provide the school calendar which is distributed to all PHMS families.
- Offered accountability benchmarks to the administration of PHMS which fall in line with the administrative recommendations based on the School Renewal Plan.

In closing, I would like to thank all of the SIC members who have volunteered their time, talents, and hard work to our school. It is a privilege to serve with these individuals without whom none of the above accomplishments would be possible.

Initiatives and Strategies

- Cougar Success Institute (CSI) The school gives students ample opportunity for academic support and intervention through CSI, a program during school hours that ensures students complete missing assignments after in-class opportunities have been exhausted.
- PHMS Ambassador Program Students were selected to serve as spokespersons, give tours, and provide support to new students and visitors.
- National Junior Honor Society The school received a charter to organize a chapter for the 2012-2013 school year.
- Collaborative Teams The school is organized into teams and gradelevels to support the students. These teams create a school-within-aschool environment.
- Professional Development—Teachers meet regularly with administrators and coaches in the "Think Tank" to discuss methodologies and data, receive training, chart MAP data, and explore new initiatives.
- Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) This testing program is used three times a year to determine students' skill levels in reading and math.
- Extra Help Opportunities Students can receive extra help through Tier II/III ELA and MATH Intervention classes, extra help sessions before, during, and after school, additional time for enrichment and make-up, and/or re-do during the school day.
- Intervention Teams Teachers work with a coordinator to identify and monitor students with interventions to ensure student success.
- Common Assessments & Planning Teachers collaborate regularly to develop common assessments and instructional activities.
- School-wide Literacy Literacy is promoted school-wide through the assistance of a literacy coach. Best practice strategies in all content areas, reading recognition initiatives, and professional development programs are implemented.
