#### **Initiatives and Strategies for School Improvement**

• PHMS is a Making Middle Grades Work (MMGW) school. We work with the Southern Regional Education Board to continually explore school improvement through professional development opportunities, high expectations, challenging cur-

riculum, engaging activities, providing guidance and using data to help make decisions.

- PHMS is organized into teams and grade levels to support our students. These teams create a schoolwithin-a school environment
- Teachers meet regularly with administrators and coaches in the "Think Tank" to discuss methodologies and data, to receive training, chart MAP data and to explore new initiatives.
- Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) is used three times a year to determine a student's skill level in reading and math.
- Extra help has been a focus with Comprehensive Remediation classes, help sessions before, during and after school, additional time for enrichment and make-up, and/or re-do during the school day.
- Teacher Intervention teams are in place to help identify students with interventions to ensure student success.
- Common assessment continues to be a major focus for PHMS this year and will continue to be a focus next year.
- School-wide literacy is promoted through best practice strategies in all content areas, reading recognition initiatives and professional development.

- ☆ The PHMS Math Counts Team placed fifth in the state and one student qualified for the National Math Counts Team Competition.

- ☆ The Race Team "Celerity Motor Sports" is currently ranked first in the nation and will be competing in Charlotte in May.
- ♦ PHMS students compete in football, cheer, volleyball, basketball, golf, soccer, track, tennis, baseball, wrestling, swimming, softball and cross-country.
- ♦ PHMS was conference champions in volleyball, first place in the state cheer competition and conference champions in girls' basketball.

#### **Faculty and Staff Honors**
