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Principal's Message

Welcome to Batesburg-Leesville Elementary School! I am proud, honored, and thrilled to serve as the principal of BLES! We have had some exciting initiatives going on this year at BLES. If you step into our classrooms, here are a few things you may see:

You may notice students wearing lanyards with pins, and talking about clipping up on the behavior chart. This is our Panther PRIDE PBIS system in action! Students have an opportunity to earn Panther PRIDE tickets on a daily basis, which they, in turn, can use lanyards and pins for their lanyard. PRIDE is an acronym that stands for the following:

Positive

Respectful

Involved

Determined

Enthusiasm

Through this system, we firmly believe that we are addressing the needs of the "whole child". Our students and teachers love this system!

You may see students engaged in 'Panther time" throughout the day. Our "Panther Time" differentiation blocks for ELA and Math are built into the day to provide opportunities for students to receive small group instruction, one-on-one instruction, and to collaborate with their peers. Technology is often integrated into learning stations at this time. Our students can hardly wait for "Panther time" each day!

You may also notice our students learning in a reading and writing workshop format called Lucy Calkins. This rigorous workshop approach starts with a whole group minilesson, then students receive individual instruction based on their teacher's assessment of their needs.

This year, we also implemented personalized learning for our fifth grade students as part of our Transform SC plan. The purpose of personalized learning is to drive student ownership of learning, and to provide the most prescriptive instruction possible for each student. Our students are in charge of tracking their own data, and also set goals for themselves as learners. Personalized learning will be implemented for fourth and fifth grade students as well in the 2018-2019 school year.

Our ultimate goal at BLES is to cultivate students who are problem-solvers, effective communicators, and lifelong learners. We base much of our planning for students around the Profile of the South Carolina Graduate. The profile focuses on world class skills such as creativity and innovation, critical thinking and problem solving, collaboration and tearwork, and being an effective communicator. It also focuses on instilling life and career characteristics in our students, such as integrity, self-direction, perseverance, and interpersonal skills. Through strategic planning and intentional instruction, our teachers are striving to ensure that each and every student we serve exhibits the world class skills and life and career characteristics that are a part of the profile.

Renewal Plan Goals

- By 2035, 90% of students will score a level two or higher on SC Ready by creating a more rigorous classroom environment and increasing support for at -risk students. By 2023, the percentage will increase from 74.2% to 79.5%.
- By 2035, 70% of English learners will achieve annual progress in English by the end of the 5th year in the EL program through supports for English leaners. By 2023, the percentage will increase from 31% to 44%.
