




ALA

The mission of the Academic Leadership Academy at Chapin High School is to utilize faculty dedicated to educating academically gifted students who are invested in their own learning in order to prepare them for a lifetime of situational leadership. There are currently eleven faculty involved in the education of these students including the current SC Academy of Science teacher of the year, the current SC Junior Science and Humanities Symposium teacher of the year, and next year's Chapin High School teacher of the year. 149 students are currently a part of the Academic Leadership Academy, including 35 graduating seniors who have an average SAT score of 1320 and an average GPA of 4.8, making them among the top students in terms of academic achievement nationwide.

Our motto is "Choose your passion; Chase your dream; Change the world," and the students of the ALA are given this opportunity through the AP Capstone program where they create their own original research to present at various science competitions. Indeed, many of the ALA students won awards this year at these competitions, including one student who won first place in the Central South Carolina Region II Science and Engineering Fair and will move on to compete in the International Fair in Dallas, TX as well as the National Junior Science and Humanities Symposium competition. The impact of students in the Academic Leadership Academy can be felt throughout the community as they complete their minimum 90 hours of community service per student.

ACADEMIC PROGRAMS



EAGLEENRICHMENT

Eagle Enrichment is an after-school tutoring program available to all students who find themselves in need of additional support when studying for assessments or completing homework in their core classes. This is a peer tutoring service, in which our student tutors help their peers overcome academic difficulties to achieve success. Our peer tutors are kind and thoughtful while they earn their service hours and help strengthen our Eagle Community. Through the generous donations of Chapin Woman's Club and their volunteers who set up

and clear away snacks each day, our students are able to fuel up prior to beginning their work. Because of federal funding this year, we were able to hire five members of CHS staff to assist students with their assignments to supplement our student tutors. We are exploring a way to expand our program to include peer-to-peer tutoring during the school day so that our students who are unable to meet after school because of the demands on their schedules are also able to benefit from their peers' expertise.

NJROTC



In April 2021, Chapin NJROTC placed 1st in the nation out of 1540 teams, and 2nd world wide in the National NJROTC Academic Exam. In June of 2018, CHS NJROTC Unit was named Best Unit for Area 6 and placed 2nd in the Nation as the 2018 Navy League Most Outstanding Unit. CHS has an exceptional NJROTC which has been in the top 3 units nationwide 7 times. Our NJROTC unit was designated as an NJROTC Distinguished Unit with Academic Honors for the 2019-

2020 school year. This was the 22nd straight year Chapin had received this distinction. This designation allows us to nominate three eligible NJROTC cadets for admission to the U.S. Naval Academy, three to the U.S. Military Academy, and three to the U.S. Air Force Academy. Our NJROTC unit has been the National Champion three times, runner-up four times, national 3rd place once, and South Carolina State Champion fourteen times.

CURRICULUM FRAMEWORK

Curriculum Frameworks organize both core courses and elective courses into schools of study in order to help students select clusters of study and majors as required by the Education and Economic Development Act of 2005 (EEDA). Rigorous academic courses required for high school graduation as well as relevant career-related courses and extended learning opportunities will prepare students to be college and career ready.

School District Five Curriculum Frameworks include Schools of Study, Clusters of Study, and Majors.

The purpose of choosing a Career Cluster in the 8th grade and a Career Major in the 9th or 10th grade for the Individual Graduation Plan (IGP) is to promote students' awareness and exploration of career opportunities related to the various career clusters and majors and to focus elective credits. The process of selecting a cluster and major is required for 8th and 9th grade students in South Carolina, as outlined in the EEDA. Students who complete the credit requirements for their major will be recognized at graduation.

Each of the high schools in District Five attempts to offer elective courses which will meet a variety of student interests and needs. However; course requests, the availability of properly certified teachers, and budget constraints determine which electives will be taught. Completion of the IGP and course request do not guarantee course availability.


